<u>Pastoral Message</u> Renegade Flowers

The great outdoors is beginning to look a lot more like springtime. The grass is a deep green and flowers are popping up overnight. I am enjoying looking out in my yard each day and seeing what's new. This year I was surprised to discover a flower in the middle of my backyard standing tall above the grass where I did not plant it. It looked happy to be out of place all out there on its lonesome. There it is doing what it does despite being out of order and not following rules of garden decorum. Technically it is a weed. Many of us would be inclined to pull out such disorderly plants. We feel ill-atease to see something, even something beautiful, not in the right place. For my part, I rather admired it for being both beautiful and a renegade and left if where it was. If it is still there when the time comes, I think I will just mow right around it.

How much more we struggle and react when such unexpected difference is found in our own species. We naturally feel most comfortable when we are with our own kind, people who fit the norm and who share the same values as we do. We have a way of segregating ourselves into our own group. We do this consciously and unconsciously. The Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. once said, "it is appalling that the most segregated hour of Christian America is eleven o'clock on Sunday morning." He was referring to the segregation of blacks and white, but the segregation does not end there.

I think of the first time, years ago, when I met who someone who had tattoos over most of his body and rings in places I did not know could hold rings. I think also of people in my rural upbringing, who people in my social class would look down upon and call uneducated "hicks." More recently I have gotten to know some who are transgender, including getting to know my own (now) niece in a different way. We might also include that person to whom we were conversing and flippantly made a political comment, assuming they think as we do, only to discover they are far from sharing our values.

Our impulse is to judge the other and label and dismiss people different from ourselves. But what if we took pains to remain open and to hold back our quick judgments? What if we also looked for beauty in those we meet, and find in them the image of God that is also in ourselves? Do we have to share the same values and opinions to get along? This is true from people who are just different from ourselves, but also from people we might label as an enemy. Dehumanization of others is the great social sin of our time. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow said, "If we could read the secret history of our enemies, we should find in each man's (one's) life sorrow and suffering enough to disarm all hostility." It was not Jesus who said this. But given who He keeps company with, it could have been.




Recent Events:

Jackie Tobin is turning 90!



A note from Mike and Beth Tobin...

As most of you know, it has been a rough and challenging few years for Jackie. In September 2016, about 1-1/2 years after moving into her new home close to us and her grand-daughters in the cute little "New Town" community in St. Charles, MO, Jackie had a bad fall. She shattered her right hip and femur. She had a post-operative stroke and while in rehabilitation for that issue was given a much-too-heavy dumbbell, which she dropped on her left (good) foot, breaking it in two places. This effectively slowed her rehab to a crawl. She pushed through and "survived" the time with the 2016 political campaign on TV, her beloved sports, and her beloved Cubs' amazing year!

Jackie was making progress in an assisted living facility and walking pretty well with a walker until she had a second major fall in December 2017, breaking her pelvis in two places. This type of break had few care options other than pain meds and non-weight bearing bed rest for almost two months. This downtime set her therapy progress back quite a bit. After the second major therapy, we moved her to another assisted living unit in a multi-level care facility closer to us. This is where she currently resides (address below). Jackie has not wanted a phone in any of the facilities she has been in and does not have one now. She has a nice apartment but needs assistance to use a walker and has learned to maneuver a wheelchair pretty well. This was not where she planned or wanted to be at this point in time.

Jackie is looking forward to the baseball season, Stanley Cup play-offs, and her youngest granddaughter turning 30. She can think of many places she would rather be and fun things she would rather be doing. She is doing the best she can to keep her upbeat, positive, and supportive attitude. She often apologizes that she can't write the birthday cards and personal notes that she always has and keeps saying she will try.

Things could be worse. She gets confused with dates and details but, for the most part, is sharper than most. She is sore from sitting and weak from immobility but not in terrible pain.

Jackie turns 90 on May 4th. We are not planning a big party for Jackie's 90th, but we will be spending some time with her on the 4th. She is more interested in what Erica is doing for her 30th on May 3rd. She is missing the things she used to do, the people she used to see, and all the "little ones" she loved to grandmother-adopt. She is tired and worn out but hanging in there. Please keep her in your prayers and know she misses her friends and years gone by.







