Prayer For Children

The way a nation treats its most vulnerable is a sign of that nation's spiritual health. Who is more vulnerable than our children, especially children in desperate situations?

The repetitive shootings of children and youth in our nation's schools is appalling and deeply painful. We can only imagine the pain of parents and their children who have experienced this act of terror. We are busy fighting the enemies outside our nation's walls in the war on terror, but the enemy is also inside our gates, even the gates of our schools. When will we insist that every means available to us be used to stop this madness? May our anger at such events be used in a way that leads us to action.

But as a people of faith, I invite you first to be in prayer. Let us keep in our consciousness the struggles of parents and children and offer these beloved ones to God in prayer:

O God, who knows what it means to be both parent and child, we pray for parents who have seen their children destroyed by violence. We are especially mindful now of those in Marysille, Washington, who were shot, killed, or wounded, and terrified by another act of senseless violence. We pray that they may be comforted in their deep grief. We pray forgiveness for this world in which such grief is possible.

We pray that our nation's leaders do whatever is necessary to prevent such a deep wounding to our nation and its children.

We pray for the families in our own country who are homeless and separated. We pray as well for all children who live in unhealthy, degrading, brutalizing conditions. We pray that mercy will be shown before the children of such families find themselves wounded, embittered, and against the law. Where moral breakdown has already occurred, let mercy, deep wisdom, and understanding restore hope.

We pray for those who have lost their children. We are mindful of those parents who face the loss of a child's life, and the potential and dreams for that child. Bring comfort in the dark moments and hope in all things.

Almighty God, what is impossible with us, will You accomplish in us, the Body of Christ? In our weakness, enable us to be Your healing presence in the world, even in those dark places where our children are suffering.

We pray this in Christ's name, Amen.

Continue to think about the stores where you do your weekly shopping and don't forget to bring a check for Manna on Sundays! Thank you for your continued support of St. Matthew.



"I Believe Even When..."

Worship and Sermon Series: Advent and Christmas Eve 2014



The stories of the Advent season which lead us into the glorious birth of the Christ Child are like the early morning hours of the day, that darkness that proceeded the rising of the sun. That time of waiting for the dawn by the characters of the Christmas story was filled with doubt, disgrace, fear, oppression, anticipation, and hope.

On the four Sundays of Advent we experience in worship this journey of the characters of Christmas to the birth of our Messiah. By looking at the first chapters of each of the Gospels, we will reflect on how these experiences relate to our own common

human experience. Someone once said, "I believe in the sun, even when it is not shining." Our Advent journey will support us to have faith, hope, peace, and love *even as* we wait for the light to shine in our darkness.

Theme Song: Peace Child - Shirley Erena Murray (Shirley wrote this song the day before the start of the Gulf war in 1990.)

Peace Child, in the sleep of the night in the dark before light you come, in the silence of stars in the violence of wars --Savior, your name.

Peace Child, to the road and the storm to the gun and the bomb you come, through the hate and the hurt, through the hunger and dirt -bearing a dream. Peace Child, to our dark and our sleep to the conflict we reap now come -be your dream born alive, held in hope, wrapped in love: God's true shalom.

November 30- Luke 1- "I Believe in God Who Comes in Surprising Ways."

The "dark night of the soul" is a phrase often used to describe moments in our lives when light, understanding, and hope elude us. A young woman barely out of childhood receives the news that she will bear a son out of wedlock. How can we learn to be open to God who acts in surprising ways through us?

December 7- Matthew 1: "I Believe in God Who Gives Wisdom in Difficulty.""Not what I expected." That must be, to put it mildly, what Joseph thought when he discovered Mary was pregnant. How often do we have to adjust our expectations when life does not go as planned? Joseph had the wisdom of God to act in love and to do the right thing. How do we listen for God's wisdom in difficult times?



December 14- Mark 1: "I Believe in God Who Speaks the Truth in Love."

God sends Jesus, but first God sends John. We all need people in our lives who are willing to talk boldly to us when we are headed in the wrong direction. John invites us to journey into the wilderness to hear the truth about what is broken in this world and our lives. Are we open to hearing God's truth?

December 21- John 1: "I Believe Even When..."

In this last week of Advent, we are ever hopeful that the same God who creates life in the beginning comes to bring life once again. The Word Becomes Flesh and dwells among us...filled with grace and truth. Are we open to receive both God's grace and God's truth that we may be made whole?

December 24 - Christmas Eve

"Unto you a child is born and he will be the Prince of Peace."

The night of mystery and awe has arrived. And Jesus is born into a world fully human and finite in its pain and beauty. God breaks in upon our lives. Can we accept that God can come to us in our imperfections and limitations?

The Darkling Thrush, By Thomas Hardy (1900)

I leant upon a coppice gate
When Frost was spectre-grey,
And Winter's dregs made desolate
The weakening eye of day.
The tangled bine-stems scored the sky
Like strings of broken lyres,
And all mankind that haunted nigh
Had sought their household fires.

The land's sharp features seemed to be
The Century's corpse outleant,
His crypt the cloudy canopy,
The wind his death-lament.
The ancient pulse of germ and birth
Was shrunken hard and dry,
And every spirit upon earth
Seemed fervourless as I.

At once a voice arose among
The bleak twigs overhead
In a full-hearted evensong
Of joy illimited;
An aged thrush, frail, gaunt, and small,
In blast-beruffled plume,
Had chosen thus to fling his soul
Upon the growing gloom.

So little cause for carolings
Of such ecstatic sound
Was written on terrestrial things
Afar or nigh around,
That I could think there trembled through
His happy good-night air
Some blessed Hope, whereof he knew
And I was unaware.



So, I got lazy and copied this from the Poetry Foundation website, but it is a perfect poem, I think, for the end of the year, and the beginning of the holiday season looking toward a new year. Hardy was not only contemplating the end of the year, but he was also thinking about the beginning of a new century as he leaned against that gate.




