An Odd Conversation

As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus, son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' Jesus stood still and said, 'Call him here.' And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man said to him, 'My teacher, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way. Mark 10:46-52

One day I was having lunch at a restaurant in downtown Chicago. I had finished my sandwich and was about to leave and throw away a half-eaten bag of chips. During my lunch, I had noticed this man strangely looking around, but not going up to the counter to order any food. He didn't look homeless - he looked lost - like he was looking for something. When he saw that I was about to leave, he came over and asked the strangest question: "Are you going to eat the rest of those chips?" I had to be sure I heard him correctly. He repeated his question: "Can I have the rest of your chips?" I stuttered an answer, "Yes...you can have them...if you want." He took them, thanked me, and walked out of the restaurant.

How very odd. What was that all about? How could someone in this country of abundance actually ask me for my leftovers? It had never occurred to me that someone might be so hungry they would dare do such an odd thing. I cannot imagine myself ever daring to be so vulnerable and bold. My pride would be wounded.

How willing are we in our lives to name before one another, and before God, our deeper desires and needs? Think about it. Yes, at this moment pause and consider - how well do you do when it comes to telling others or God what you really want and need? A lot of drama is created in our relationships because we do not risk putting these needs out there with clarity.

All of us are hungry in some manner. Every person is in need. We can resent our dependency all we want. But we share this one fact in common - God made us as people who need each other. Community is built on this shared need.

"What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asks a blind man. What a strange question to ask a blind man. But Jesus knew the blind man needed to ask for himself.

"What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus is asking you and waiting for your response. Peace, Pastor Allen

Sabbatical Time

For the months of May and June, the church has granted me a time of sabbatical. Most United Churches of Christ offer this time away (usually 3 months) after 5 to 7 years of active ministry as a part of their covenant to care for the pastor's well-being. It is a time of study, intentional prayer, rest, and time with family. Because of concerns regarding my father, who is now in hospice, I thought it unwise to take the full three months, knowing there is a chance I will need to go and be with him at an unpredictable time.

After six years of ministry, I am looking forward to having quiet time to restore my ministry with study and prayer and to spend time with my family. In May, I will reconnect with youth group friends from high school (all of whom are ministers) and hike a sacred pilgrims' trail in northern Tuscany and then spend five days of study in Rome. I am also planning prayer and study days to work on my reading list and center myself in my faith. In early June, I'll travel with my children to visit my father and my brother and his wife, who now has a serious disease. As a family, in June, we will be traveling to see the Grand Tetons and Yellowstone National Park and then join St. Matthew's group of 12 on mission in Costa Rica.

So what happens at St. Matthew in my absence?

Sabbatical is meant to be a break from routine for pastors and that means a temporary release from pastoral duties. The pastoral team will support the congregation when there is a pastoral need.


Pastoral coverage will be provided by Rev. Kendra Joyner Miller, an associate pastor at First Congregational Church in Glen Ellyn. She will be supported by other local area UCC pastors if she is unavailable. May and June will be a festival of outstanding preaching including Quinn Rosenthal, Emily Davis, Tyler Spellious, Terry Gallagher and hopefully a few surprises from St. Matthew's past. A preaching schedule will be available when it is complete. A lay church member will be the liturgist for each Sunday to support our guest pastor.

Sabbatical is an intentionally subversive act against our world where work defines us. It is a yes to God and reflection. The benefit is that I will be able to come back refreshed with new vigor and directions for our life together as a church. I wish this was something offered to everyone. In a world where many only have one or two weeks of paid leave (and some none), we fail to understand the power of time away for the good of the

whole as well as the individual. Fortunately, the UCC church and other denominations see the value of this, as do some corporations (such as McDonald's).

I will enjoy sharing my experience with you when I return in July. I will use my time well. The church leadership and I will be sure that St. Matthew is in good hands the weeks I am gone.

Pennies From Heaven

Let's turn our umbrellas upside down!

God provided manna for the Israelites wandering in the wilderness. They didn't have to do anything for it, just gather up what they needed for the day.

Our SCRIP (Manna) program is just as easy. Simply order cards for the places you know you are going to shop anyway - grocery, drug stores, gas, etc. It costs you nothing and the retailers donate to St. Matthew.

Here's an example: I buy a \$100 Jewel card from Scrip and Scrip gives St. Matthew \$4. If I did this 50 weeks a year, the church would receive \$200. If 40 people did the same, St. Matthew would receive \$8,000.

Over 60 St. Matthew families have participated in Scrip/Manna at one time or another, although our average is only 7 families per week. If all 60 families could participate regularly (weekly or even biweekly), we could easily make our fundraising goal for this year.

Sunday, April 15th Sunday, June 24th Sunday, August 19th Sunday, October 21st







New Member Interviews




Deb Lipinski

Al's Eggs (feeds 2-3)

2 Tbsp. olive oil

3-4 medium-sized tomatoes on the vine cut up in small pieces

1-2 tsp. garlic powder

1-1.5 tsp. turmeric powder

1-2 tsp. Morton's Nature Seasonings (to taste)

4-6 Eggs


jalapeno or cayenne pepper (to taste)

This recipe really depends on your taste and several other factors, including the size of tomatoes and measurement of spices.

Put olive oil in frying pan. Over medium heat, add tomatoes to pan. Sprinkle seasonings on the tomatoes (to taste). Cover and cook seasoned tomatoes until they are really soft and juicy. Add jalapeno pepper or cayenne pepper (to your taste), stir and let it cook for a few more minutes.

Drop eggs on top of the tomatoes, cover and cook until the eggs are done medium-easy. You want to make sure that the eggs are not over-cooked or too hard. Serve and enjoy! Bon Appetit!




