The Practice of Peace

"Put your sword back in its place," Jesus said to him, "for all who draw the sword will die by the sword." (Matthew 26:52)

Jesus spoke these words of loving rebuke to Peter, who had just cut off the ear of the high priest's servant. "Those who live by the sword, die by the sword." Jesus was reminding Peter (and us) of an obvious truth we have a way of forgetting: violence begets violence. That is as true for verbal violence in the form of harsh and hurtful words as it is of physical violence. What we put out into the world has a way of coming back to us. Jesus taught us to break the cycle of violence. His instructions "to turn the other check" were not suggesting a passive response, but a deliberate defiance, which communicates fortitude and a refusal to be a victim. But it is also a response that effectively breaks the cycle of violence, one that invites peace.

Standing before Pilate, Jesus declares, "If my kingdom where of this world, my followers would rise up and fight. But my kingdom is not of this world." Unfortunately, most of us are not oriented to the "other" world in which Jesus lived. Our world is better represented by Peter, who in the gospel narrative has a way of standing in as "every man and woman." Peter's impulse for violence is our human impulse.

For a time, the first Christians lived this ethic of peace, staying close to Jesus and the apostle Paul's teachings. But by the fourth century, when Christianity was made the legal religion by Emperor Constantine and the persecution of Christians quickly ended, Christians became the persecutors.

Christians begin by killing other Christians over doctrinal issues such as the nature of the divinity of Jesus. Soon violence against Jews was practiced, followed centuries later by the violence of the Crusaders against Muslims.

But the heart of our faith is the way of peace that Jesus taught. As Paul said, "We are to be ambassadors of reconciliation." Rather than impulsively responding by reacting with rage and violence, we are to discover creative ways to create reconciliation and peace. In the name of Jesus, we are to perform the greatest miracle of Jesus' life, responding to hatred, ignorance, with love and even forgiveness.

This informs our current debate around gun laws and Congress's failure to pass meaningful legislation. In all the debate, I find myself wondering, why is there such an acrimonious defense of the right to bear arms and an insistence that even the most modest of regulation not be approved? I find this difficult, if not impossible, to defend as I look to my own Christian faith and my understanding of our vocation in this world to be peacemakers. I cannot imagine either Jesus or the Apostle Paul waving a pistol in their hands and insisting that everyone defend their right to bear arms at all cost, not with so many of our children dead in our streets and in our schools.

You may disagree with what I say in this article and hold another view, and that is to be respected. But I ask all of us to struggle with how your faith speaks, challenges or supports, your perspective. If we confess that Jesus is our Lord, then we must even include a difficult issue as this under his Lordship.

Why are we still having floods?

After the installation of the drains around the back of our building, the rain water drains into the pond at the front of the Church. There is a small pipe that then drains the pond. As part of the development of the lots in the More Property a new sewer line will be installed on South Gables Blvd. We will then have the pond connected to drain into the new sewer line. Until that happens the water from the pond will be able to flow backwards and come up in the back door drain when the pond level is higher than the back door drain. With heavy rains such as we had on April 17 and 18 the pond filled and the water started to come up into the back door well. Until the new sewer line is installed we will continue to use sand bags around the back door and pumps to evacuate the pond and the back door well when the water gets high.
