Is Peace Possible?

This Christmas Eve proved to be one of the most worshipful times I can remember for many years. Ask any pastor and they will tell you how difficult it is to both have the responsibility for leading worship and feel engaged in the worship at a personal level. But Christmas Eve as we sang the carols, heard the good news, and celebrated the birth of Jesus in dance and choral music and bells, I found a profound sense of peace coming over me. Now as we enter this new year, I find myself wondering if I can hold on to the peace that I have felt.

To say the least, peace is elusive in our world. We are still reeling from the attacks in Paris and the shootings in more places than I can name. Many hearts are in deep grief as we enter this new year. There is an ugly faith in hatred and violence that has a grip on many nations, groups espousing terror, and lone wolf individuals committed to doing horrific harm. Protestors in our streets have brought our awareness of the long-standing problems of violence in our cities and unresolved tensions between police and parts of our communities. But they have not brought peace or the justice they demand. The political season is heating up and much of the rhetoric we are hearing plays on our fears, is divisive and destructive of our national unity in a time when we need to come together.

How are we to hold on to the peace that our faith has promised by angels singing in the sky? How do we live in a world committed to violence and hold to a faith committed to a way of peace?

I am not entirely sure, but I do know it will have much to do with where I keep my focus. I can focus on the world and find myself caught in the battles that are raging or I can focus on this Christ child born in a chaotic and indifferent world just like the one we live in. His way is a peace that comes quietly in unexpected ways and place. His peace is subversive. It does not come by a frontal assault or reactive response to violence with more forceful violence. As Jesus says, the kingdom of God is among us and within us. The peace comes only to those who are open and hungering for a new possibility, like the shepherds in the fields.

Jesus was certainly attentive to the social injustice of His time and the violence that He witnessed. He confronted it by speaking to it boldly and truthfully. But He spoke out of a deep sense of peace and He proposed an alternative to the world's violence which involved clearing our own hearts of violence. As He said, ""You have heard that the ancients were told. 'YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT MURDER ' and 'Whoever commits murder shall be liable to the court.' "But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother shall be guilty before the court..." (Matthew 5:21-22). Jesus understood that the road to peace begins with each of us and the way we stay in God's love in the midst of the world's violence. It is only from a place of peace that we have any chance of bringing peace.

Happy New Year! May this be a year of peace regardless of what comes next.



UPCOMING EVENTS





This year's annual meeting will be on Sunday, January 31st after worship service.


