Honoring the Body

"Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price.

So glorify God in your body."

I Corinthians 6:19-20

If I were to ask you to make a list of important practices that are part of living a Christian life, I suspect you would come up with practices like: prayer, regular worship, generous giving, giving thanks, acts of charity and love, maybe even fasting. I doubt you would place honoring the body on your list. However, I would dare to say that this practice is a particularly essential one for the time in which we live.

Christianity is reclaiming our appreciation for the goodness and beauty of our bodies. There is a shift away from a hypersuspicion of the lustfulness of the flesh and the idea that our souls matter and our bodies do not. We recognize, as did our Hebrew forefathers and mothers, that our body, soul, and spirit are indivisible and intricately woven together. We are our bodies.

From the very beginning of the creation, God declared the creation as "Very Good." That includes the environment, but also our bodies. Christian theology insists that Christ came to save not only people, but Creation itself. Christ comes to bring a new Creation. All this affirms that God is not only acting to save our souls, but our entire selves and the world we live in.

We often abuse our bodies. I asked a room full of men once to wrap red bandages on all the places on their bodies where they had been wounded in their lives. The room was covered in red. Men in particular have a way of sacrificing their bodies, using them as tools in work and play (think of intense sports and back-breaking work). Women are often encouraged to judge their body's worth only in its value to attract, resulting in objectification. This also results in a great deal of insecurity when their bodies do not perfectly conform to some ideal standard.

No matter how our bodies are shaped or handicapped, whether they are fragile and aging; God affirms that they are good, wonderful, and beautiful. The world does not determine the value of our bodies, God does.

How can we affirm the value of our body at all stages of our lives? Perhaps a start is to take a good look in the mirror at our bodies as they are and give God thanks. St. Francis lived a rather stern and ascetic life in which he subjected his body to the abuse of the weather and work. In fact, he called his body "Brother Donkey." At the end of his life, seeing his body broken down and fragile, he begged the forgiveness of his body for the abuse he had subjected it to. How might we look at our attitudes towards our own body and ask its forgiveness? How might we live more respectfully and thankfully towards the body we have been given?

Children's Ministry



Up-Hill


By Christina Rossetti (1830-1894)

Does the road wind up-hill all the way? Yes, to the very end. Will the day's journey take the whole long day? From morn to night, my friend.

But is there for the night a resting place?
A roof for when the slow dark hours begin.
May not the darkness hide it from my face?
You cannot miss that inn.

Shall I meet other wayfarers at night?
Those who have gone before.
Then must I knock, or call when just in sight?
They will not keep you standing at that door.

Shall I find comfort, travel-sore and weak? Of labour you shall find the sum. Will there be beds for me and all who seek? Yes, beds for all who come.



I bring you this simple, but contemplative poem, which you can interpret in a variety of ways. Whether you see it literally as a journey or trip that you must make in the immediate future; life's journey; the journey from birth to death; or a metaphor for a difficult task ahead of you; it offers comfort in the answers to the eight questions. I think it resonates for me, in part, because I will be facing my own rather long but happy journey home to Wheaton for the holidays in November. Widely anthologized, I took this poem from Committed to Memory, edited by John Hollander.


