#### **Giving Your Life**

Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Matthew 11:29

When I was a young person growing up in the church, I heard at church about the early Christian martyrs who sacrificed their lives for the faith. I remember my fascination with the many stories of the martyrs. Somewhere I found a list of people who were killed as missionaries. Accounts like the ones of missionaries who gave their lives in New Guinea in order to share the faith. One list gave the names, the dates of their martyrdom and the method of their killing. The one missionary who was listed as "killed, eaten" really got my attention. With my youthful idealistic imagination, I dreamed of find myself in some such situation in which I had to chose whether to die for the faith.

Needless to say, it has not happened yet. The sacrifices I have made when compared to those who have (and still do) make the ultimate sacrifice seem a mere pittance.

Have you ever considered what it means to "give your life"? I suspect we minimize the way we give ourselves and underestimate the importance of the tiny sacrifices we make. The card we write to someone ill, the food we bring to fellowship, the committee meeting we attend that go long when we have to wakeup early the next morning and go to work, the night we work at PADS and endure a tiring next day, and the money we

give even when finances are tight may seem such small sacrifices. But it is the little bitty things we do that matter, often more than we may ever know, and they add up to a life well lived.

Sometimes we think of those little bitty things and wish we could do more of them, but tell ourselves we do not have time. Think about that statement, "I don't have time." It is really a dishonest statement, a little lie we tell to others, but mostly to ourselves. Early in my ministry, I had the good fortune of having someone call me on that. He told me how he transformed his life by refusing to say it. Instead he says, "It's not my priority right now." As long as we are standing upright and still breathing we do have time. We are not victims of time; we have the power to make our choices, to say either "yes" or "no" according to what is important at that moment in our lives. Very empowering.

Jesus asks us to take "his yoke" and he promises that we will find "rest for our souls." That is not the way we always experience church work and service to God in our daily lives. Rest? Exhaustion may be more to the truth. But I think what he really meant was "peace." The sort of peace you have when you have chosen wisely your priorities and are living your life well.

The poem for November, from Linda Leinweber in Kazakhstan

Hopes Painted by the Autumn Cold By Sergei Yesenin Translated by Deutsch and Yarmolinsky

HOPES, painted by the autumn cold, are shining, My steady horse plods on, like quiet fate, His moist dun lip is catching at the lining When the coat, flapping, flutters and falls straight.

On a far road the unseen traces, leading Neither to rest nor battle, lure and fade; The golden heel of day will flash, receding, And labors in the chest of years be laid.

Although I had read a few of Yesenin's poems some time ago, I was reintroduced to him by Josef's Russian teacher (also mine), when she gave him a poem to translate. It occurred to me that a Russian poem coming from Kazakhstan would be a nice idea for fall, so I chose the above, in part because it reminded me a little of Frost's "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening." Yesenin, who died very young, was banned by Stalin, but continues to be very popular in Russia, is not a voice one hears a lot in America, so I am glad for the opportunity to share this poem.
