Reflections from Pastor Allen

This upcoming Lenten season I will be sharing with you in a Wednesday night study five practices of the faith that will support you walking on the way of Jesus. I want to give you a "taste" of some of what we will be discussing with an excerpt from Dorothy Bass' book, "Practicing the Faith" which is my primary resource for our Wednesday night studies.

"I never thought I'd be living this way," she says. "Somehow I imagined that life would be simpler."

She has reached forty and she thinks she should have her life together by now, but things are just not right. Too few evenings include nourishing suppers shared with loved ones; too many are given over to the demands of paid work or housework, or lost to worry and exhaustion. Her closest friends are spread across several time zones. The old neighbors she entrusted with the house key are gone, and she barely knows the new ones. She finds community here and there, and she volunteers to help out as she can, but she is wary about getting too involved. Showing up at a PTA meeting, she has learned, probably means getting stuck with a fundraising assignment,

so increasingly she stays away, in spite of her intense concern about her children and all the others. She does not feel right about this. "This is not how I intended to live my life," she sighs, turning from one task to the next.

The sighs of this woman and so many of us today come only in part from having too much to do. Even more, these sighs are born of our yearning to understand what the too-much-to-do adds up to. We long to see our lives whole and to know that they matter. We wonder whether our many activities might ever come together in a way of life that is good for ourselves and others. Does all this activity make a difference beyond ourselves? Are we really living in right relation to other people, to the created world, and to God?

These concerns engulf the unemployed as well as the busy professional, the retiree as well as the young parent, the recent immigrant as well as the lifelong citizen. Lacking a vision of a life-giving way of life, we turn from one task to another, doing as well as we can but feeling increasingly uncertain about what doing things well would look like.

All the while, an uneasiness lies just beneath the surface - an uneasiness made of personal restlessness, worry about our loved ones, and apprehension about the well-being of the world."

As your pastor, I believe there is a way to negotiate life and make the necessary choices to live a whole life with purpose and meaning. But this requires practical commitments and support from a faith community. The good news is that we have centuries of Christians who have faced the challenges that we face and have sage advice for us to follow. We are a people of the Way. I invite you to join me for an exploration of that Way this upcoming Lenten season.

Responding to the Newtown Mass Shooting and Gun Violence in Chicago

On Christmas Eve, I said that the senseless and brutal murder of 28 children and adults in Newtown, Connecticut and the over 500 people murdered by gun violence last year in Chicago requires us as Christians to respond in a meaningful way. I said that after this last mass shooting, we cannot simply move on as if nothing ever happened.

Since that time I have been in prayerful reflection about how to respond as well as listening to many different points of view. The issues are not simple to address as the Newtown event has generated emotionally reactive responses from opposing camps of the political and social divide. I am inviting you to join me over coffee and tea for a discussion of the issues involved and how they relate to our faith. My intentions are that we have a respectful discussion where all points of view are welcome and that we begin to find a way we can respond to these ongoing acts of violence in our communities and schools. Remember that change only occurs when ordinary citizens care enough to take action. I also want this to be a prayerful time that honors those who have died rather than only talking about the politics involved. Hopefully, we can discern some clear ways we can come together and make a response and perhaps recognize that there are other ways we will not find agreement.

My suggested date is Thursday, February 28 at 7:00 p.m. at the church. Let me know your thoughts and your interest. That will be helpful as I prepare to structure our time so that we use it well.


NOVEL APPROACHES



The Shrimp Boil restarts an enjoyable St. Matthew Tradition





Printed below is the Macaroni and Cheese recipe that was made for the Shrimp Boil. Many people requested the recipe. I thought the easiest way to make sure everyone has access to the recipe is to put it in the Voice! Enjoy!

SHRIMP BOIL MACARONI AND CHEESE

2 tbsp salt

4 qts boiling water

12 oz elbow or long Macaroni

6 tbsp of shortening (I would substitute butter).

4 tbsp enriched flour

2 tsp salt

dash pepper

2 tsp dry mustard

3 cups of milk

4 cups sharp cubed (or diced fine, shredded) Cheddar Cheese, such as Cracker barrel (about 1 lb)

Add salt to boiling water. Gradually add macaroni and cook until tender, about 15 minutes. Drain and rinse. While macaroni is cooking, melt shortening (butter) in saucepan. Add flour, salt, pepper, and dry mustard. Mix well. Gradually add milk, stir constantly until thickened. Remove from heat, add cheese and stir until melted (you may need to have the heat on while melting the cheese). Fold in macaroni. Pour into a greased 3 quart casserole pan. Add more cheese on top, if desired. Bake in oven at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes (watch carefully to ensure you don't overcook it).

Some Affirming News- How Mission Contributions Make a Big Difference

I just thought you all might enjoy hearing of an encounter I had after the New Year. For me personally, it just made my day (and week and month).

I received a call from a young woman that works for an Oak Brook organization. She told me that her company, American Utility Management (AUM) had arranged to have a Christmas tree placed in their company lobby during the holiday season. It was a "mitten" tree, and all of the employees were encouraged to bring in new mittens, gloves and hats to decorate the tree. Before Christmas then, the decorating mittens would be donated to children in need, and the Children of Bridge Communities had been chosen to receive them.

When the phone call came to me it was mid-January. The Christmas season had become hectic at AUM and the mittens/hats had not been delivered as they had planned. The young woman phoning me was looking for an address so that she could ship the boxes to Bridge. I asked where AUM was located and she told me they were in Lombard on Butterfield Road. Because I go that way quite often and really wanted to have a personal presence with the donors, I volunteered to just stop by and pick up the boxes a few days later.

Upon arrival at AUM the receptionist asked me to wait while she called two co-workers, Amy and Cara, to give me the boxes. I recognized Amy's name as the person who had called me, but did not know who Cara was. I met the two women and as I was thanking them for their efforts I asked them why they had chosen Bridge Communities as the recipient. I asked how they knew of us.

Cara responded to me that she was a graduate of Bridge Communities. She disclosed that she had been in the Bridge program in about 1997. She had fled a domestic violence situation, found Bridge Communities through Catholic Charities and eventually graduated from the program. She had been employed by AUM for the past 13 years.

The thing is, we do not often get to see the product of our work over a long period of time. We are usually so intensely involved with the here and now of transitional housing that we do not have the luxury of seeing how the most successful of our clients turn out in the long run. They are able to use our services for a very short period of their lives, return to the "real world" of life after transitional housing, raise their families, and become productive members of our society.

Bridge Communities and the partnering church did for Cara what we do for every client that enters our program. We gave her an opportunity. We gave her nothing more. Cara did the work. The opportunity was what she needed. My thanks to all of you that do your part in giving Cara, and all those other hard working folks who are in a difficult place, an opportunity.

The Way

By Lynne Bryer (1990)

He came out, walked free looked like an ordinary, sweet grandfather from the eastern Cape: those lovely old men we children knew were wise and saintly when we saw them walking down the streets in ancient suits, greatcoats from the First World War. We always greeted, an exchange both courteous and right.

So, now, grown older, we salute
Mandela. Not the bogeyman whose face
was a forbidden sight (abroad,
we looked in libraries): nor charismatic
warrior, giving tongue in blood and flame.
The Heavens did not fall.
But then, for days before, the mountain
(struck by lightning) burned,
the dark alive with crimson snakes
writhing on air, black elevation of the night,

Omens alone foretold the change. And confirmation came less from our eyes, watching the images that flew about the world, than from the way we felt: elated, cool, not doubting this was true, the destined time and place.


This is the way messiahs come—when time can stand no more delay, and people walk the streets, mill in the square, climb trees to see. Even the soldiers, nervous in the mob (since they alone were armed, and hence not free) are part of the rightness, the dislocated, sudden calm of knowing: This was the way it had to be.

Bryer, a white South African poet, changed the name of this poem to *Release*, *February 1990*, to make more clear that the subject is Nelson Mandela. I thought this was a good choice for February, although I confess I was tempted to choose a love poem. Still, this is a love poem of sorts as well as a reflection on a monumental change, which started in February. Enjoy!
