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PASTORAL MESSAGE Rev. Allen Mothershed

And They Cast Their Crowns before the Throne
And they lay their crowns before the throne and say,
"You are worthy, O Lord our God,
to receive glory and honor and power.
For you created all things,
and they exist because you created what you pleased."
(Revelation 4:10-11)

Susan Wold shared with me her excitement this year about a new focus on teaching our children how to worship God. This comes with a new awareness on her part of the true meaning of worship, which is rather far from what most of us call worship. True worship is centered around God, becoming aware of God's presence, character, power, and love. It has very little to do with us, what we want, the style of our music, or the way the pastor preaches, or even our "getting" anything from worship to "see us through the week." The profound meaning of worship is summarized by the verse from Revelation in which all of heaven and earth are focused on praising God for who God is as it has been revealed to us through what God has done:

"You are worthy, O Lord, our God, to receive glory and honor and power. For You created all things, and they existed because You created what You pleased."

Note that praise is not exactly the same thing as thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is thanking God for what God has done. Praise is a dimension beyond this. Praise is an appreciation of the very nature of God. It is an acknowledgment of God's awesomeness. When we praise God we find ourselves humbled and aware that we are nothing close to God. As wonderful as we are and our life is, when compared to God our place is far from central. It is no accident that worship in the above scripture begins with "they lay down their crowns before the throne."

Such humbling of ourselves is not about having a diminished sense of self and groveling in shame for who we are. Rather it is knowing our true place and value in relation to God, who is the one who has given us life and sustains life for us. What we receive from worship is a gift of freedom to no longer have to live as if we are in the center or to imagine that life depends on us. When we have reverence for God (a sense of awe and respect), we learn to have reverence for our own lives and every living being.

The problem for our world is that we often want to make ourselves or other human powers or entities the center. How opposite is this understanding of worship to most Christians who approach worship as something that should "please me" rather than God? I do not think we would have "worship wars" over music style, as so many churches have had, if we really believed we gather to worship as a way of casting off our thrones and focusing on God. I also believe that if we centered ourselves in praise and thanksgiving of the One God, we would not be so exhausted when we drag ourselves to church on Sunday after a long week of feeling like we needed to be more than human in our job and our family.

I invite you to come to worship this year with this reflection in mind. Come to worship with a desire to praise God and be filled with thanksgiving. Begin worship and end with worship with an offering of yourself to the only One worthy of our focus. You might simply begin and end worship with a simple phrase, "I praise You, God, for You alone are God and worthy of praise." Even now, before dwelling in heaven, we join in the chorus of praise in heaven. Amen.



In a recent political crackdown and power consolidation in Turkey, more than 180 media outlets and 2,000 universities and schools have been shut down. In addition, more than 140,000 people have been discharged from jobs and 125,000, including journalists, academics, and judges/prosecutors have been detained. Many have fled the country to various destinations, including Chicago, in fear for their lives.

Organ Dedication Will Be a Celebration of Music and Generosity By Lee Staton, Church Council President

During our worship service on October 15th, we will officially dedicate our new organ and honor the donors whose generosity made it possible. This is the story behind that celebration.

Last fall our congregation was in an accelerated race against time, of which many people were unaware. Those who knew about the problem worried that the crucial point could come on any Sunday. Our organ, in use since the congregation moved into the then-new sanctuary in the early 1990s, was failing.

Organist Brian Dobbelaere and music director Jamie Craig were acutely aware of the problem. So was Joe Hall, who had spent countless hours repairing the organ to keep it going, a task that required increasing ingenuity since the manufacturer was out of business and parts were no longer available. As Jamie noted, the old organ was "past dead. We knew we were on borrowed time."



So in mid-2016 a committee started looking for a replacement, consulting several companies and traveling to churches and showrooms throughout the area to hear and play state-of-the-art instruments with capabilities that had increased exponentially since 1990. The committee decided on a Rodgers-brand organ from Triune Music in Elmhurst and brought a recommendation to the church council. But the price – close to \$70,000 – raised an important question: how to pay for it and whether we could raise the money before the old instrument died.

As the congregation debated that daunting challenge and whether we could get by without an organ, two long-time church families – the Mooks and the Halls – stepped up and offered to pay for the new instrument. An additional contribution from the estate of former member Tom Thomas rounded out the fund.

Between them, Dave and Diane Mook and Joe and Marge Hall represent 90 years of dedication to our congregation. The Halls chose St. Matthew when they moved to this area in 1967, with the Mooks coming 10 years later in 1977. All four have served as council president. They have filled numerous other leadership and service positions in the church and the community.

When asked what motivated their generous donations to purchase the organ, all four cite the importance of music – and the organ – to the church. "We could not envision a church without an organ," Joe says. Diane Mook calls music "the glue that holds the service together."

Music director Jamie Craig says everyone – not just those in the music ministry – should be grateful for the donations that made the new organ possible. "It was an amazing gift to the church," he says. And organist Brian Dobbelaere knows the value of the new instrument as well as anyone. "It's like going from a 78 RPM record to a CD player," Brian says. "It's leaps and bounds better."

By happy coincidence, the new organ arrived shortly after St. Matthew acquired a brand new piano – at no cost, due to a manufacturer's flaw in the previous instrument. "The church is in fantastic shape with instruments," Joe says. "Now we just need more voices (to sing in the choirs)."


