PASTORAL MESSAGE Rev. Allen Mothershed

### "TELLING SECRETS"

"No one lights a lamp and then covers it with a washtub or shoves it under the bed. No, you set it up on a lamp stand so those who enter the room can see their way. We're not keeping secrets; we're telling them. We're not hiding things; we're bringing everything out into the open." (Luke 8:16-17, The Message Bible Paraphrase)

That is a scary thought, everything secret out in the open. It makes me think about the common recurring dream people have while sleeping, of walking in some public place and realizing you have forgotten all or part of your clothing. Exposed. Shame and Humiliation. "We do not discuss our family's dirty laundry," we have heard said. And it is true. There is a necessity that our privacy be honored and respected. There is a time and a place for revealing our secrets and not everyone deserves privy to them. Thank God our courts have managed to find a right to privacy in our Constitution, even though it was not made explicit by our founding Fathers.

But there is a big difference between our need for privacy and covering up truths that need to be somehow and in some place shared. Some secrets we may think of as saving us, when in reality they are destroying us. Frederick Buechner writes in his book "Telling Secrets":

"Our secrets are not hid from God, says the ancient collect, but they are hid from each other, and some of them we so successfully hide even from ourselves that after a while we all but forget they exist." He goes on to list some of his family secrets: "a father who at parties drank himself into a self I could hardly recognize as my father, and a mother who in her rage could say such wild and scathing things to him that it made the very earth shake beneath my feet when I heard them, and a two-and-a-half years younger brother who for weeks at a time would refuse to get out of bed because bed, I suspect, was the only place he knew in the whole world where he felt safe. I knew that my father's suicide was a secret when that time came, but it was only a great deal later still that I realized that his life too had become a secret, almost the very fact that he had existed at all—the way he had looked and talked, the way it had felt to be with him, the way it had felt to be without him back there at the (cont'd. on pg. 2)

start before I had learned that the rule was that I was not to speak about such feelings and thus finally lost them to silence."

We are saved by the truth. The truth sets us free. Allowing the light of Christ to help us see the truth about ourselves, our world, and one another can literally save us when that truth also includes grace and a lot of compassion with it.

And what is true on a personal and an interpersonal level is also true on the national level. "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is that good people do nothing," said Edmund Burke. When we allow falsehoods to exist we allow evil to triumph. My experience of the silence of good Christian people while unspeakable things were allowed to happen to people of color in my home state of Mississippi has taught me how essential it is that we "turn the light on" whenever we see injustice in our world. That means shining the light on our racial attitudes, police brutality, and the nonchalant attitudes of sexism towards women.

There is a time to say with Jesus, "We are not keeping secrets; we are telling them." Let's shine the light in our lives and in our world.

## NOTES FROM THE MUSIC ROOM

A reminder of upcoming "Open-Choir Sing" dates for this spring: February 19th, March 19th, April 30th. I have found some new music that will be fun for all to learn and share. Please join us.

### **BELL NEWS**

Did you know, our own "KC" Congdon is in the Guinness book of World Records? As a member of the Handbell Musicians of America, she and 663 other ringers were part of the largest handbell choir in the world! She has graciously shared the story with us:

Handbell Musicians of America (of which we are members) joined forces with the Salvation Army and the Mall of America to pull off a chance to make the Guin-



ness book of World Records (GWR) to be held by the United States as the largest handbell choir. We broke Japan's record of 500 ringers!

On November 19th, 2016, hundreds of ringers gathered in Bloomington, Minnesota to kick off the Salvation Army's Red Kettle campaign. Here's what we had to do in order to meet the GWR requirements:

- Step 1: Those ringers participating had to play a recognizable piece of music for a minimum of five minutes. At the request of the Salvation Army, the Guild commissioned Hart Morris to write an arrangement combining *Silver Bells* and *Carol of the Bells*.
- Step 2: Next the Guild put together a planning team which consisted of your very own handbell director, KC Congdon, and 3 others from around the states (IL, OH, KY, and AZ).
- Step 3: We had to recruit ringers from North America through *E-Notes, Overtones* and social media. Seven hundred ringers signed up!
- Step 4: Once we received the final score, we had to review the rules that stated that *all ringers must be kept busy; no long periods of rests.* This required some creative assigning which is where KC came in.
- Step 5: Rehearsals and memorization were to be done on their own for which the Guild supplied the score and created an mp3 file. They also set up a Facebook page so that people could communicate and organize group rehearsals or offer tips on practicing alone.
- Step 6: No bell tables or foam or music stands would fit in the facility, so everyone had to pack their own bells in their suitcase.
- Step 7: Organizing that many ringers requires quite a process. We set the ringers up in groups of 50, gave them wristbands and told them where to go and when at the mall. Each group of 50 had a qualified moderator to make sure everyone was participating once the timing began based on the criteria.
- Step 8: The Salvation Army and the Mall of America did the publicizing and marketing by getting this on all the social media available, news feeds, newspapers, along with television and radio.

Step 9: With a giant video screen in the rotunda of Mall of America, we were able to post the music, along with our mission as well as the mission of the Salvation Army's Red Kettle campaign.

Step 10: The final countdown did not go as smoothly as we had hoped. Some of the original 700 ringers couldn't make it due to the blizzard that was heading toward Minnesota. Then we found out that the staging area we had originally been promised was double booked and was now being used by a Norwegian reality show holding a casting call. This required some reworking of the processional and entrance to the rotunda. BUT, we pulled it off. When it was all finished and the numbers tallied, the GWR adjudicator stepped to the microphone and announced the results: 664 ringers met the requirements! The US of A now holds the Guinness record for the largest handbell ensemble.

As the Executive Director said, "Handbell Musicians of America is honored to have been part of this wonderful event and to support the worthy mission of the Salvation Army."

Congratulations KC, and to all who participated.


