Disappointment

"I am astonished to find you turning so quickly away from him who called you by grace and to follow a different gospel. Not that there is a different gospel, only there are persons who unsettle your minds by trying to distort the gospel of Christ."

The Apostle Paul in Galatians 1:6-7

I am amazed at the ability of my children to give full verbal and emotional expression to the bitter disappointments in their lives. A trip is cancelled by a rainy day, a friend cannot come over as expected, they cannot have a toy they desire, or, God forbid, Mom or Dad says a firm "no" to ice cream before dinner. There is wailing and gnashing of teeth. At times, their bodies cannot contain the disappointment and go into hyper mode: everybody duck!

As a parent, my first response is to attempt to calm them down, appease them with some alternative that might soften the blow of bitter disappointment. I do not like to see my children disappointed. Even though I know better, a part of me feels like I have failed them when I cannot grant their every wish.

As adults, we learn to modify our emotional expressions of disappointment (well, most of us do most of the time). Sometimes our unexpressed disappointment turns into depression or sadness. Other times it seeps out like leaky toxic waste barrels with snide comments of blame or criticism of those around us. Children express it and it is done with, but adults often hold on to disappointment, stretching it out over time, with the fallout felt all around.

We might find comfort to discover that even a saint such as the Apostle Paul had his own bitter disappointments; read through his letter to the Galatians. That new church did not go as planned and Paul is searing with anger. He shortens his usual greeting at the beginning of the letter, leaving out expressions of thanksgiving, and quickly zooms in on his target, like a hunter anxious to fire the first round. The issue is that some outside group is telling the Galatians that non-Jewish converts must be circumcised. At one point he is so mad that he says, "I wished (those leaders) would 'cut' themselves." There is a fine line in our faith between our justifiable passionate commitment to the faith and allowing that commitment to be expressed in hurtful words. Paul seems to have crossed that line.

The truth is that disappointment is very much a part of our lives. We would do well to acknowledge our disappointments, emotionally allowing for them as our children do, but with a more mature expression. The wise understand that life rarely goes as planned and God is with us in those moments of disappointment. Who better to be with us during those times? Surely, God whose love is so often unrequited can be present to us during our many moments of disappointment.




Food on the First



One Pilgrim's Voice

Oh, the joy when I saw the St. Matthew travelers debark from the plane on June 17th! They may have been a bit bedraggled and jet lagged, but they looked heavenly to me, as I had successfully hooked up with everyone after arriving one day early from Kazakhstan. I had already found Leslie, who flew separately and a little earlier on the 17th, and Flavia, the tour director, but before too long, there was Allen and the gang and we were off with Silvio at the wheel of our bus and Flavia at the

helm of our tour, to downtown Rome. A whirlwind walking tour, which was a little hard on my jet lagged comrades, took us to see many wonders of Rome, including the Trevi fountain, waterless due to restoration work, but into which I tossed a coin anyway, not wishing to take a chance of never coming back to Rome. We also saw the Pantheon, now a church and distinguished by constant use since its construction, and many other sites. We enjoyed a restorative dinner at a local restaurant and my weary fellow travelers finally got some rest.



Rome was overwhelming and awesome...and really old! And the food was wonderful, my favorite being a place that in the past had been a hangout for Fellini, but all wine tastings and restaurants were great! From the papal blessing, which brought more than 75,000 faithful to the Vatican, during which time the sun shone; to the Colosseum) and Roman Forum, during which time it rained in a sort of turn around of Romans versus Christians, to the enormity of St. Peter's and the Vatican Museum; to the overwhelming creative power of Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel, Rome offered more than I could really take in at one time, but I did my best. The four layers of St. Clements well demonstrated the layered quality of Rome. Before leaving Rome, we stopped at the Necropolis of the Vatican and toured pre-Christian gravesites as well as Christian, ending at the sacred place where St. Peter's remains were discovered. It was a fittingly spiritual end to our time in Rome.

Assisi took us to a beautiful Umbrian hill town filled with the power of St. Francis. Much slower paced, we enjoyed the many churches and monasteries affiliated with St. Francis, including St. Mary of the Angels, housing the tiny church St. Francis built; the basilica of St. Clare, containing the crucifix of San Damiano, which answered the young Francis's prayers by telling him to rebuild the church; the cathedral of San Rufino, the patron saint of Assisi; the basilica of St. Francis, where Francis is buried; and the old monastery which brought home Francis's asceticism. Who could forget Le Infiorate, the flower festival in Spello, with the elaborate carpets of flowers and petal pictures dedicated to Corpus Domini. And, of course, there was a lot of shopping to be done, and hills to climb, and a lovely sharing communion atop Mt. Subiaso on Sunday.

Two days in Florence was barely enough time to get a feel for this marvelous Renaissance city, but we tried, strolling through the Ponte Vecchio; visiting the Duomo and its amazing doors; paying homage to Dante, Galileo, Rossini and Michelangelo at Santa Croce; of course, giving our greetings to the magnificent David at the Academia; and spinning through the Pitti Palace. We even saw a terrific fireworks display in honor of San Giovanni. Too soon, we were sharing our farewell dinner and I was bidding my St. Matthew fellow pilgrims goodbye after a truly memorable trip. See you in November!

This surely includes the flood of immigrant children that have recently come into our country who are among the most vulnerable and for whom we have a clear moral responsibility. An Open Letter on Child Refugees

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

The Council of Conference Ministers of the United Church of Christ and the Collegium of Officers offer this open letter to the church in response to the flood of child refugees coming to the United States from Central America. We write it in solidarity with our sister churches in the Southern California/Nevada Conference, the Southwest Conference, and the South Central Conference whose boundaries are coterminous with our neighbors to the South.

We have all been watching over the last weeks child refugees by the tens of thousands risk life and limb to flee violence and poverty in their homeland, hoping to find safety in America. The story of this land being rich with possibility can be heard even by children in far away lands. It is the same story that we heard with pride when we were children. It stirs their hearts, as it did ours, and compels them to leave everything behind except for the hope that it might be true.

It is fast becoming apparent, however, that the collective will to care for these children is far below whatever expectations they might have had. For them, the story that fostered such hope is met with profound disappointment as once in the US they are being detained, disgraced, and deported – treated more like criminals, terrorists, and threats than children, refugees, and victims of unspeakable horror.

As leaders in this denomination, we stand in solidarity with the children who seek refuge here. Our churches are fast becoming part of a network built to respond to these overwhelming needs. We cannot meet these needs alone. We are seeking to forge partnerships with those who are just as moved by the courage and suffering of these children, and who wish to extend to them love, comfort, and justice.

Deeply aware not just of our own immigrant stories and roots, but also of the clear biblical imperative to care for the stranger in our midst, we invite all settings and all leaders of the United Church of Christ to respond in any of the following ways:

- Pray for the children who seek refuge across our southern border, and see in them the face of Christ;
- Support with your donations organizations that house, clothe, feed, educate, and provide medical care to the refugee children;
- Write to your elected Representatives and share with them your concern for these children, asking them not to see them as a threat to us or as criminals;
- Stay alert to emerging opportunities to respond to the needs of the refugee children. One good source can be found here on the UCC website.
- Prayerfully consider sermons, newsletter articles, adult and youth classes that articulate a narrative of care for the stranger and alien among us.

The United Church of Christ has a long and proud history of demonstrating courage in the struggle for justice and peace. Now, as ever, our resolve is being tested. It is with a good deal of hope and courage that we face this injustice. Let the actions forged by our compassion silence the voices of hatred and fear that ring right now in the ears of these precious children of God. Let them know we are Christians by our love.

We are one with you in Christ.




