The Power of Letting Go

We talk a lot in Christianity about the necessity of sacrifice, something that sounds painful, and not something many of us want to hear much about. As Christianity has at the center of its faith the cross of Christ, this should not surprise us. After all, Jesus said that if anyone wants to follow Him, then they are "to take up their cross and follow Him." The "take up the cross" part is something we wished Jesus could have simply left out. Why is sacrifice so necessary? Can't we have a religion that is more joyful and less costly? Can I have a faith that gives me more than I have to give?

Let me see if I can help us out, not by removing this imperative, but by reframing the way we are inclined to think of sacrifice. A better word for sacrifice is "letting go." Letting go is something we all recognize as an integral part of life. We live our lives by letting go. I doubt there is a day in our lives where we do not have to let go of something. If you think back on your life, you have always been letting go of one thing so you can pick up something new (and hopefully better). If you are married, at one point you let go of the single life for a life with a partner you love. If you have children, you let go of the freedoms of doing what you want to do for the joys of our children and the enormous bond of love that we share with each other. If you retired, you let go of daily work commitments to invest in other values of your life. The truth is that not one of us has the power to hang on to our life the way it is. Life is change, and the better we are at learning to let go and adapt the happier we are in our life.

When we are asked to let go (to sacrifice) and follow the way of Jesus, we are asked to trust that in letting go something richer and more satisfying is being offered to us. By learning to let go, we create an empty space where something more satisfying can fill our lives. Most of all we learn to let go of self. Holding on to self is the way of death and pain. The tighter we hold on, the more restrictive we live. Letting go of self-preoccupation makes room for loving relationships and community. In letting go, we learn to trust and make room for love.

Think about this when we talk this month about stewardship and what it means to be a generous person. You can choose to see your giving as a burdensome sacrifice, or you can see it as an opportunity to let go and experience the joy of being about something far larger than yourself, and far more life-giving. Amen.

Prairie Path Clean-Up








Handprint tree "lifting our hands in worship."




