The Wonderful Life

I remember well the first time I watched "It's a Wonderful Life" with Jimmy Stewart and Donna Reed. I was on a large church bus driving through the night to bring a bunch of United Methodist college students home from skiing in Winter Park, Colorado. In the closing scenes I cried like a baby, though I tried to hide my tears from those who were around me, most of them fortunately asleep. Now it is a holiday tradition to watch the movie.

I have watched the movie enough to allow some of the other scenes I might have missed that first time to have an effect on me. I remember Mr. Potter, the wealthiest man in town, who owns most of the town and wants to own it all, making his offer to hire George Bailey, the Jimmy Stewart character, to manage his property. Greedy and conniving Mr. Potter has George sitting in that low chair at the front of his desk. He recites the truth of George's situation: a young man with a beautiful wife and young children, trying to care for his family and his widowed mother as he has traded his dreams to remain home and care for the family's Savings and Loan. What he leaves out is that the Savings and Loan is the only institution in town that cares about its working class clients and the community. Potter reminds him of how on the edge he lives and what he cannot provide for his growing family. He then makes him a financial offer that no one in their right mind would refuse. But George comes to his senses. As much as he lives in regrets of what he has sacrificed, he angrily rejects the offer and calls a spade a spade. Only at the end of the movie does he come to understand the great value of his life in what he does in service to others and the love of family and friends.

In the movies, we often see life as a battle between good and evil, but in our lives we either do not see the contrast or see lots more shades of gray. But the truth be told, we are in a struggle between good and evil. We make choices all the time about the sort of person we are going to be. I think of Christmas as a fine example of the struggle. The paradox of Christmas is just how subverted its message has become. When we think about it, we should be amazed that a holiday about the savior born to a poor family in a manger who taught generosity and devotion to the disenfranchised has become a holiday about accumulation and satisfying our lust for more.

I offer some suggestions this holiday season for living the faith and staying on the side of what is good. Try to bicker less and judge less those members of your family who have been a disappointment. Allow yourself to focus on what is right about people, including yourself. Refuse to buy more stuff you will throw away a few months after the holidays or longer if your guilt prevents you from acknowledging you wasted your money. When you have the urge to take care of an allimportant shopping detail or other item on your "Christmas to-dos," stop and do something in the moment to share and receive love. Offer to work at a PADS shelter and sit down and have a holiday meal with strangers who will relish a warm place and a nourishing meal. You may be surprised that it could be the best conversation of the holidays. Don't buy the gifts you feel you must buy, give the money away to those who need it most. Really, you have a choice in all this. Live your faith in the holidays and subvert the culture's practice of Christmas, rather than participate in the culture's subversion of the true Christ.

I loved the Peanuts comic when I was a child, but because of my soft heart it always bothered me that Charlie Brown never got a break. I'm sure many others felt the same way. Maybe Schulz had a message in mind, as he liked to implement messages into his cartoons, but come on, not one break? Couldn't he let Charlie catch the football, fly the kite or win the ball game once and a while? Then to top it off, in the 1965 Charlie Brown Christmas Special, he gets the smallest and least attractive Christmas tree, causing him to be humiliated in front of his friends...again. If Charlie wasn't being mocked, he was being ignored. I really hurt for him. (Yes, I know he is fictional.) However, the one shining light for Charlie was that he had Linus for a friend, and what a wise and good friend Linus was. I tear up whenever Linus starts telling Charlie the true meaning of Christmas. How wise Mr. Schulz was to bring Christ into Christmas that year. He couldn't have known that the low budget television special that took him only a few weeks to write and was deemed a failure by the producers and network before it aired would go on to receive outstanding critical acclaim, winning an Emmy and a Peabody Award. He never could have fathomed that the little Charlie Brown special that he threw together in a few weeks would

still be viewed every year since it first aired and has been shown in 75 countries and translated into 21 languages. We can't even begin to guess how many hundreds of thousands of adults and children have heard Linus give that message of what Christmas is all about, year after year. It touched my heart way back then, but it took many more years for me to realize that Charlie had something bigger and greater than getting the lucky breaks in life; he has Jesus as his Savior, and of course, Linus to remind him of it. Schulz once said that he created Linus to represent himself and his Christian faith. Charlie Brown may be fictional, but his story is very real. Many people cannot get a break, are ignored and misunderstood. My prayer this Christmas is for all those Charlie Browns out there. I pray that God will put a Linus in their life, leading them to Him who loves them just as they are.

Christmas in Sunday school

The Reaction to the Promise – Jesus' Birth: For every action there is a reaction. This Christmas the children will examine God's action of sending Jesus and the reaction of the Christ Child on Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the Magi and King Herod. We will also talk about our reaction to the Christmas story and how it affects our lives. Workshops in art, a movie, Birthday Party for Jesus, cooking and astronomy will tell the Christmas story in a new way. **Dec. 6**, Art: The children will make ornaments for the outdoor Mary Jane Schnack memorial tree. The children were very special to Mary Jane. It was her request that they decorate her tree every year at Christmas. Dec. 13, Movie and popcorn: throughout the Christmas story, the children and teacher will discuss the reactions of those who were close to Jesus at His birth. Dec. 20, Birthday Party for Jesus: The children will play games pertaining to the Christmas lesson. When worship ends we will bring them downstairs to sing "Happy Birthday" to Jesus and have birthday cake with their St. Matthew family. Dec. 27, Cooking: the children will make "Promise Shortcake" and learn that the promise God gave to us is Jesus. Jan. 3, Astronomy: The children will become astronomers and react to God's galaxy as they lie under an awe-inspiring constellation canopy. They will learn how the wise men reacted to the birth of Jesus as they followed the Star of Wonder. The children will learn, like the three wise men, that they can be wise and seek Jesus, too. 


Calling All School-Aged Musicians!



"Love Came Down at Christmas" Advent Worship Series

November 29th: "Love Came Down at Christmas: Loving Justice"

We hear the word "love" used in so many ways that it has become almost useless. The scriptures use other words to describe what love actually looks like. Words like justice and righteousness. Join us as we begin our Advent Season with the prophet Jeremiah and words of hope.

December 3rd (Thursday): "A Service of Taize"

Gathered in the presence of Christ, we sing uncomplicated repetitive songs, uncluttered by too many words, allowing the mystery of God to become tangible through the beauty of simplicity. This worship service, that has become popular around the world, focuses on meditation. Candlelight, simple music, readings, and time for quiet reflection all with a focus on God rather than the worship leaders are the essence of Taize worship. A beautiful way to slow down and begin the Advent and Christmas Season.

December 6th: "Love Came Down at Christmas: Stand Up for Something!"

This Sunday we are blessed with the Christmas Cantata by our Sanctuary choir. Our worship will focus on what it means to "Stand Up for Something," that our lives may be relevant and reflective of the love that came down both in John the Baptist and in Jesus. Join us for beautiful, heartfelt music, an early taste of Christmas, and for a simple message to prepare us for the coming of Christ.

December 13th: "Love Came Down at Christmas: He's Naming Names"

Love is more than a nice idea, but one that points the finger at what needs to change. Love requires us to reorder our lives and to live God's dream for creation. Join us to reflect on what it means to make the way clear for the coming of the Lord.

December 20th: "Love Came Down at Christmas: To Those Not Expecting"

Our children's excited voices will be heard as the anticipation of Christmas builds and they celebrate "A Birthday Party for Jesus." In worship, we rejoice with Mary and Elizabeth, two mothers-to-be, who both share the joy of unexpected pregnancies. How does the God of surprises come to meet us in our lives and world?

Christmas Eve: "The Way of Love: The Divine Dance of Love"

Two worship services: 6pm and 10pm. Our 6pm service is family-friendly and will begin with Christmas selections played by some of our children and young people before the start of the service. The children will also be gracing us with a short bell piece and song. We gather at 10pm for a traditional lessons and carols service with prayers. Both services include candle lighting.

While we are captivated by the dramatic high stakes of politics and economics as the means for the salvation of the world, our Christmas story surprises us with a dance of characters far off center stage. God chose to bypass the privileged and enter into our world through a poor, unmarried teen mother. This Christmas, we are moved by the simplicity of love that shatters expectations.

cused internally and externally. By Coming Together and combining our resources, we are able to do great things!


FAMILY CAMP SIGN-UP HAS BEGUN!
