A Conversation

"We would be better off if we were not such a charitable nation." I had to catch my breath when I heard a good friend speak those words with absolute conviction. "What? You are against charity?" I asked. I began to wonder about my judgment when it came to friends. He could see the shock on my face and started to laugh. "No, I really mean it." He continued, "We middle-class people give money all the time to charities. We go to benefits and buy things at charity auctions. We are one of the most generous people in the world when it comes to giving. I have a problem with that."

"You know you are talking to a pastor who preaches generosity as a core faith value," I countered. He said, "Well, it is not being generous that I have a problem with. My problem is that we deceive ourselves and justify ourselves by our charity while we tolerate the fact that our nation, the richest in the world, allows people to live in the streets and have no guaranteed healthcare." "Oh, now I understand," as I began to relax. "Your problem really isn't charity; your problem is that our rationalization prevents us from confronting systemic injustice." "You got it," he applauded me.

He was onto something. I remember when I was a young pastor in rural Mississippi and hearing church people tell me that they did not believe in government handouts. They were against welfare and food stamps. They would then say, "It's the church's job to help people, not the government's." It's hard to argue with part of that. Churches are called to serve the poor. But there was a lack of honesty about how generous church people actually are and how big the problem is. Most churches don't get far beyond making their meager church budgets, and there are some who complain during annual pledge drives. Those who thought this way had a complete failure to understand that, in the scriptures, God holds the nations accountable for injustice and violence. They had no awareness that scripture has justice and peace as a dominant theme.

There is a lot of room to disagree with how the government goes about dealing with injustice. You'll find good suggestions from both ends of the political spectrum. But, you would think the gross gap between the haves and have-nots is so morally repugnant that we would not dare argue about that.

Those gaps are glaring in this time of economic shut-down. We see who has power and who does not. We see where the bulk of government virus relief goes (about 5% to individuals). We know who gets the tax breaks and the generous tax write-offs. We see who must live as the exposed in order to survive economically and who can afford to stay safe.

“But let justice roll down like waters,
and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.”

The prophet Amos was speaking for God as he commands the religious people who come to the temple to make their offerings on the Sabbath day only to tolerate injustice to the poor every other day. God’s tolerance had come to an end.

Ok, homework this week: read Amos 5. It will broaden your faith and encourage us to stand with the most exposed in these times. And yes, charity has its place. So, be generous.

A message from our Council President

Greetings to all of you, and may God's blessings of peace be with you all. Howard and I miss seeing each one of you, and look forward to the time when we can be physically together for worship and fellowship.

Thanks

First of all, I want to thank everyone who has worked so hard to prepare our worship services for online viewing. Thanks to the tech team who works hard every week to pull the pieces together. Thanks to the music team who tries to bring the musical feeling of our in-person services into our homes remotely. Thanks to Susan for continuing to create and present meaningful messages to the children. Thanks to the scripture readers, announcement readers, worship service planners and, of course, to Pastor Allen, who are all doing a great job of learning to navigate this method of worship.

I also want to thank our office staff, Dani and Jean, for keeping the administrative side of things operating as close to normal as possible.

And to all the other volunteers – those working on the building and grounds, those working on committees and in on-going ministries, and to everyone else who takes even just a bit of the load to keep St. Matthew running smoothly – my sincere thanks.

Financial Health

I also want to inform you all about something we are doing to help ensure the financial viability of St. Matthew over the coming months. After careful consideration and much healthy debate, Church Council approved the decision to apply for an SBA Payment Protection Plan loan, and we were successful in gaining those funds. We received a loan of approximately \$44,000 to ensure that we can keep all of our employees fully paid during this time, especially given the uncertainties associated with contribution levels. Based on numerous webinars I have attended over the past few months, I am confident that, from a government perspective, we will be granted loan forgiveness (i.e. the loan becomes a grant, and does not have to be repaid). However, depending on how pledge revenues evolve, we can make our own decision as to whether we repay all or part of the loan (at 1% interest and payable over two years). In the meantime, to borrow a statement from our member John Adams, this loan "ensures we stay an active, thriving congregation who contributes significantly to the community."

More Property Development

The company that is developing the More property (7 homes along the Prairie Path) plans to begin work this summer. As such, you may see construction equipment and work being done. This is good news for us, as it includes improvements to our drainage system, as well as some other aesthetic improvements.

The Future

Finally, we are exploring and discussing ways to use this time to consider how St. Matthew can become even stronger in the future. As we have heard in the faith-based webinars we have been attending, we should take this opportunity to craft what a new normal will look like, rather than simply yearning for the old normal! I ask for your prayers as well as your ideas as we move through this uncharted territory.

Music Appreciation Sunday

It was requested that I put a copy of my Music Appreciation message in The Voice for those who didn't get to see the service. –Jamie

Good morning,

Today is the weekend before Memorial Day and is also what we call Music Appreciation Sunday. It is that Sunday when both our bell choirs are in full presence, our praise band is leading our singing, and the Sanctuary Choir has a special anthem to end the church year. This is also known fondly by KC as an All-Skate.

Well, I look around our beautiful sanctuary, and I don't see the full bell choirs here. I don't see the praise band here. I don't see the choir here. And I don't see you here. What a strange way to end the musical year.

Rehearsals and in-person services stopped in March, with the initial hope that there might be a chance to be together for Palm Sunday, or at least Easter. Well, as we know, that didn't happen, and now two months or so later, we may or may not be any closer.

As you all know, our services have drastically changed in these past couple of months. Social distancing means that a very limited number of us gather to put the service together, with planning done by phone, email, and Zoom meetings. Where we can involve people via recording, such as for the announcements or scriptures, we have done so. The 'He Is Risen' videos sent in by many families are another way we connect. For music, that is much more difficult. Rehearsals for bells cannot be held remotely as the bells are here at church. The choir and praise band cannot rehearse together because of the close proximity needed in a rehearsal. And, of course, the same goes for Sunday morning. So what can we do? Brian and I are here putting the music together for the service, and John Kouns has volunteered to join us so we have some harmonies. But what could be done for a choir? So I took a gamble and asked if the choir would be interested in trying to put together a virtual choir. The answer was an overwhelming, "Yes, let's try it!" And you have seen the results.

We prepared and recorded an anthem for Easter Sunday and then another for the Call to Communion at the beginning of this month. The process is quite intensive, and I won't go into all of it here, but I want to tell you some, so you know the dedication of the people involved. They had to rehearse their parts on their own. No rehearsal to ask questions, no fellow tenor or soprano to rely on in an area they may not be comfortable with, none of the confidence boost that comes from singing in a group. It comes down to just recording themselves singing their part while listening to an accompaniment track. And then they have to listen and watch it to make sure no mistakes were made, or they moved out of the camera view. We are our own worst critic, which doesn't help. Then they send it off to me, waiting until the service is put on the web to see how they did. To everyone that made a video for these virtual choirs, for all the effort that you put into them, I thank you.

Now, that is the easy part. When the videos are received, they all have to be blended and matched up. This is not an easy task or a quick one. Several trials are made before we arrive at a finished product. I cannot take credit for this process. The tireless work of Gwen Johnson and Marge and Joe Hall made the choir's efforts come together and appear seamless and professional. Gwen, Joe and Marge, I thank you for all that work. As it looks like we will not be back together for a while, I anticipate a few more of these efforts.

Of course, I don't want to minimize the input and efforts of our bells and praise band. Tirelessly, they rehearsed and graced our services all year until sidelined by the stay-at-home orders necessitated by Covid-19. And they would be here today if not for those orders. I thank you all, and especially those of you who are here today to help us worship, socially distant from each other, but not from God.

Now for me, this church year also started strangely. I was trying to recover from a severe case of vertigo that kept me from commuting to my day job, and I found I could not direct the choir. I could not stand without the strong possibility of falling into the drums or music stands. I couldn't even drive here. Fortunately, Joe Hall stepped up without hesitation, took the baton, and filled in for me until my balance returned enough for me to retrieve it. Joe, I want to thank you again for your willingness and talent to step in. And Rachel, thanks for driving me each week until I healed enough to drive myself.

Finally, we recognize our teachers and musical groups, but I realized that there is one other group that we, as a congregation, need to thank. Without these people, our worship would be significantly different, be it when we are together or in these current days. I am referring to those who work and support the audio/visual aspects of our service. There is a great deal that goes into making it look easy. Each week all the prayers, songs, scriptures, announcements must be entered and proofread, just like the bulletin. The slides are changed for our prayers and congregational singing. The audio is monitored throughout. The service is recorded and then uploaded to the website, breaking out the sermon and the different selections by our musical groups. Those supporting this ministry include Gwen Johnson on video; Rick Jungk, John Adams, Joe Hall, and Marge Hall on entering the information for the screens and then running it on Sunday; Joe Hall, John Adams, Rick Jungk and myself all help on the sound, along with Andrew Kouns, my son Andrew, and our newest sound techie during these socially distant days, Lisa Curda.

I don't know when we will be back together as a congregation, but I'm grateful to those people I have noted today in their willingness all year long to share God's word through music or for the behind-the-scenes work needed to support our worship services.

Thank you to all of you, including you at home.

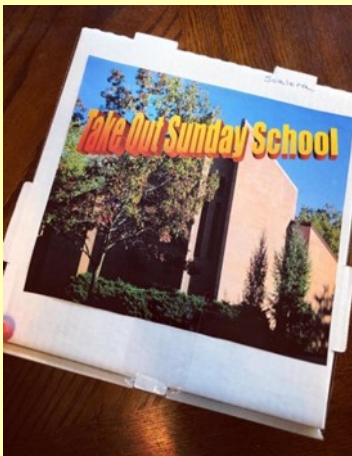

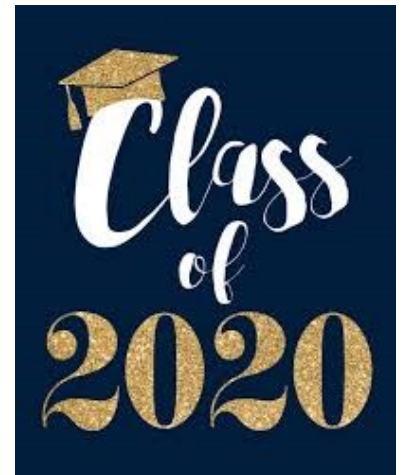

Simple Communion Bread

Ingredients:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup water

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

Mix flour, oil, and salt together in a bowl; add water and mix using a pastry cutter until dough is soft. Form dough into 6 balls and press into disks onto the prepared baking sheet using your hands.

Bake in the preheated oven until bread is cooked, 8 to 10 minutes.

While any bread or juice will do for Communion, if you like and need something creative to do during this time at home, then try this simple communion bread recipe.

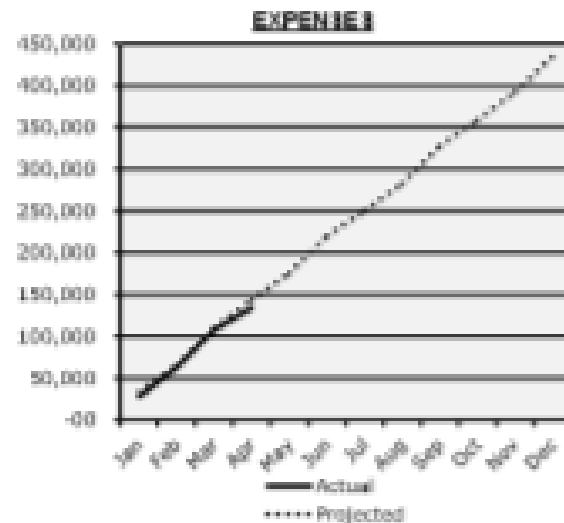
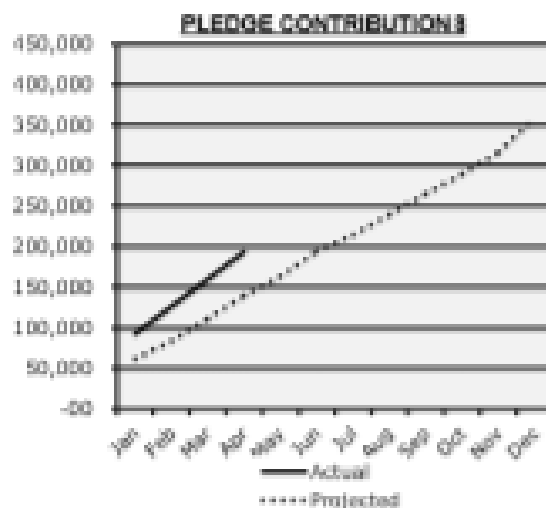
