The Drug War and the Killing of Michael Brown

Many of us from the church who are working with the Community Renewal Society had an engaging afternoon at John and Jeannine Adams' home as we watched a documentary together: "The House I Live In." The film peels back the complex layers and reasons so many are stuck in dehumanizing and destructive ghettos in our inner cities. The film does this by looking at the long history of drug use and the war against drugs in our nation. Most helpfully, it shows the horrific affects of the drug war on the people hopelessly caught in those neighborhoods. The film lays bare the terrible human cost and the enormous financial burden of the war on drugs. It does this through conversations with those who are intimately involved: a judge, a prison guard, those imprisoned, families whose loved ones are imprisoned, police officers, and those who study these issues.

I wish every person in our congregation would watch this film, which is now in our church library. I wish every American would watch it. I believe it would be especially helpful as we attempt to understand the rage of the people in Ferguson, Missouri, at the grand jury's decision not to indict Officer Darren Wilson in the killing of Michael Brown. Perhaps we could all gain a new level of empathy and understanding of one another. I fear that the tragedy of Michael Brown's shooting will find no redemption if we do not come to see the racism and injustice that is very much alive in our nation.

So much focus has been on whether Darren Wilson is guilty of shooting this unarmed teenager.

Frankly, I find it rather interesting that any of us is really in a position to so easily judge the rightness or wrongness of the grand jury's verdict. Some seem so convinced of Darren Wilson's guilt and others of his innocence. We should all not want the rage of many in Ferguson to possibly scapegoat one police officer. Nor should we want the shooting of another unarmed black youth to be excused and justice denied.

A Christian response requires that we identify with vulnerable, disadvantaged, and poor communities. That is gospel. That is Jesus. That means attempting to understand the rage that is behind the reaction of the black community. We ought to ask the question as to why a community has risen up with such rage. That rage needs to be validated and put into context. There is an undeniable history of unfair application of the laws in Ferguson as there is in our nation. Racial minorities, especially black and Hispanic, will testify to what it is like to live with the fear of racial profiling (just ask someone who is a minority). Only a nation that wants to turn away and not look at the truth and leave our brothers and sister in pain will continue to ignore the deeper issues.

This Christmas, we will celebrate that the light of God came into the darkness of our world. Jesus was born into a poor family in a world that experienced gross injustice and oppression. When we read our scriptures we see him daring to speak up to those who were in power, even to the point of sacrificing himself for the disadvantaged. We as followers of Jesus are called to take this same path of working for peace and justice.

Advent Season in Sunday School

December 2014

Our Advent season is a fun and meaningful time for the Sunday School children. For three of the four Sundays the children, preschool – fifth grade, will gather together to sing Christmas songs and watch a four-part movie of the Christmas story. Following the movie they will join their age-appropriate classmates for activities and crafts. Our special Sunday is “The Birthday Party for Jesus,” when the children celebrate Christ’s birth in fun ways and the Family Christmas Eve service is a special time for families to come together to celebrate the true meaning of the season. I hope that your children can join us.



December 7th: A Message for Mary The children will watch a short video where the Angel Gabriel approaches Mary with God’s message that she would give birth to the Christ Child. They will learn about Mary’s answer; “Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word,” Luke 1:38. The children will make the first of their Advent crafts, an angel.

December 14th: Mary and Elizabeth The children will learn about Mary’s visit to her relative Elizabeth, and Joseph’s tough decision to accept God’s plan for his and Mary’s life. They will watch the second part of the video lesson, followed with activities and a nativity craft.

December 21: Birthday Party for Jesus The children will learn about the birth of Jesus by watching the third part of the video lesson. They will celebrate with a birthday party for Jesus, where they will play games and make a craft of baby Jesus. At 10:30am the children will be taken downstairs to Dobstaff Hall, where they will join their church family to sing “Happy Birthday” to Jesus and eat birthday cake. Each child will receive a gift in honor of Christ’s birth.



December 24th: The 6 pm Christmas Eve service This service is a “family friendly” celebration of Christ’s birth. If you plan to attend this service and your child would like to be part of the nativity scene – Joseph, Mary, Angel, Shepherds, Kings, sheep, etc. – please let me know. These are not speaking parts. The children will go to the front of the church and get in position as the Christmas story is read by older youth. The service will end with the entire congregation lighting candles (battery-operated candles are provided for young children) and singing Silent Night. This beautiful service is a wonderful prelude to the important Christmas morning message: Jesus is the reason for the season!

December 28: The Magi The children learn about the Magi who traveled many miles to bring gifts to Jesus; the Kings will learn that Jesus had a way better gift for them than they had for Him. The children will make a Three Kings craft to complete their nativity.

Did You Know?

Today, Advent is observed during the four weeks leading to Christmas--but the original observance was something completely different. In the 4th and 5th centuries, Advent was a six-week preparation for the season of Epiphany, not Christmas. Back then, Advent was a time for self-reflection and soul-work (kind of like Lent today); new converts to the faith prepared themselves for baptism, faithful believers examined their hearts, and everyone spent time reflecting on the Christian story and their place within God's mission to bring the Kingdom come.

Be sure to give yourself a little quiet time this Advent season--do a little listening to God's still-speaking voice. Then stop by Emmy's office and share what you think: What do you love about the story of Christmas, and the whole Christian story? How is God calling our youth group? How is God calling you?

An iPod donation is a great way to repurpose these devices, get them into the hands of those who could benefit most and keep them out of landfills.

“I Believe Even When...”

Worship and Sermon Series: Advent and Christmas Eve 2014



The stories of the Advent season which lead us into the glorious birth of the Christ Child are like the early morning hours of the day, that darkness that preceded the rising of the sun. That time of waiting for the dawn by the characters of the Christmas story was filled with doubt, disgrace, fear, oppression, anticipation, and hope.

On the four Sundays of Advent we experience in worship this journey of the characters of Christmas to the birth of our Messiah. By looking at the first chapters of each of the Gospels, we will reflect on how these experiences relate to our own common human experience.

Someone once said, “I believe in the sun, even when it is not shining.” Our Advent journey will support us to have faith, hope, peace, and love *even as* we wait for the light to shine in our darkness.

Theme Song: *Peace Child* - Shirley Erena Murray (*Shirley wrote this song the day before the start of the Gulf war in 1990.*)

Peace Child,
in the sleep of the night
in the dark before light
you come,
in the silence of stars
in the violence of wars --
Savior, your name.

Peace Child,
to our dark and our sleep
to the conflict we reap
now come --
be your dream born alive,
held in hope, wrapped in love:
God's true shalom.

Peace Child,
to the road and the storm
to the gun and the bomb
you come,
through the hate and the hurt,
through the hunger and dirt --
bearing a dream.

December 7- Matthew 1: “I Believe in God Who Gives Wisdom in Difficulty.” “Not what I expected.” That must be, to put it mildly, what Joseph thought when he discovered Mary was pregnant. How often do we have to adjust our expectations when life does not go as planned? Joseph had the wisdom of God to act in love and to do the right thing. How do we listen for God’s wisdom in difficult times?

December 14- Mark 1: “I Believe in God, Who Speaks the Truth in Love.”

God sends Jesus, but first God sends John. We all need people in our lives who are willing to talk boldly to us when we are headed in the wrong direction. John invites us to journey into the wilderness to hear the truth about what is broken in this world and our lives. Are we open to hearing God’s truth?

December 21- John 1: “I Believe Even When...”

In this last week of Advent, we are ever hopeful that the same God who creates life in the beginning comes to bring life once again. The Word Becomes Flesh and dwells among us...filled with grace and truth. Are we open to receive both God’s grace and God’s truth, that we may be made whole?

December 24 - Christmas Eve “*Unto you a child is born, and he will be the Prince of Peace.*”

The night of mystery and awe has arrived, and Jesus is born into a world fully human and finite in its pain and beauty. God breaks in upon our lives. Can we accept that God can come to us in our imperfections and limitations?

Robert Bridges, Poet Laureate, United Kingdom (1913)

Pax hominibus bonae voluntatis (Peace and goodwill to all men)

A frosty Christmas Eve when the stars were shining
Fared I forth alone where westward falls the hill,
And from many a village in the water'd valley
Distant music reach'd me peals of bells aringing:
The constellated sounds ran sprinkling on earth's floor
As the dark vault above with stars was spangled o'er.
Then sped my thoughts to keep that first Christmas of all
When the shepherds watching by their folds ere the dawn
Heard music in the fields and marveling could not tell
Whether it were angels or the bright stars singing.
Now blessed be the towers that crown England so fair
That stand up strong in prayer unto God for our souls
Blessed be their founders (said I) an' our country folk
Who are ringing for Christ in the belfries tonight
With arms lifted to clutch the rattling ropes that race
Into the dark above and the mad romping din.
But to me heard afar it was starry music
Angels' song, comforting as the comfort of Christ
When he spake tenderly to his sorrowful flock:
The old words came to me by the riches of time
Mellow'd and transfigured as I stood on the hill
Heark'ning in the aspect of th' eternal silence.

I am also told that Gerald Finzi set the piece to music in a work entitled In Terra Pax, for chorus and orchestra. Name Tags

Every Sunday we say to people that "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey you are welcome here." As a congregation we want to give everyone an extravagant welcome. We are excited to share with you that we have made permanent (or long-lasting) name tags. • We already have one made with your name on it, if you are a member and/or a regular attendee. • The name tags are on a board just past the steps at the north entrance. (Please note that the name tags are magnetic. If you have a Pacemaker or would like a pin tag, please let Diana know.) • If you do not see your name tag hanging, look in the basket. • If for some reason we have overlooked you, write us a note on the clipboard and we will get you one for the next Sunday. • There are also sticky ones for our guests and for the children. Of course, it is up to you to find your name tag on the board and put it on. Also, remember to place it back on the board (in alphabetical order) before you leave. This is a great way for each of us to give our guests and those who are new an extravagant welcome, but also for all of us to avoid the awkward times when we just can't recall someone's name! The good news is that the cost of doing this has been covered by a memorial fund from John Roberts that has not been used for many years. Those of you who remember John Roberts will remember that he was the guy who every Sunday greeted people at the door by name and with a warm smile. He was always ready to greet everyone "with a warm hand and a warm heart." His spirit of hospitality lives on as long as each of us remembers to put on our name tag!

Worship Note for Advent

In the Advent season, reflection and times of silence take central importance. To honor this we are changing the placement and the style of "Passing the Peace" in our worship for Advent. For the next four weeks, soon after the Prayer of Confession, we will be asked to give a sign of God's forgiveness by saying a word of peace to those around us. We are asking that everyone remain in their pews and simply say to each one around them either, "Peace!" or "Peace be with you!" This is a common practice in both the Protestant and Catholic faiths. We want to honor worship as a time to speak meaningful words of faith that center us in the love and grace of God. We have the opportunity as we come into the sanctuary and as we leave or go to fellowship to have conversations and offer other greetings. In truth, the word "peace" is the most loving word we can speak to one another. It is from the Hebrew word "Shalom" which means "may God's richest blessing be yours" and "May God make your life complete!" What could be a more friendly word?

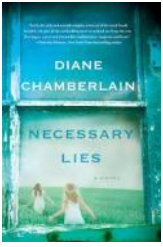

Roberto's Italian Turkey

Day before marinade: Butter, Worcestershire sauce, salt, meat tenderizer, paprika, seasoned salt.

Tomato Sauce:

15 tomatoes

1/2 Cup Worcestershire sauce

1 large onion

1 large green pepper

4 Bay leaves

Pickling spices (toss first)

Sesame seeds

Pasilla chile pods

Garlic

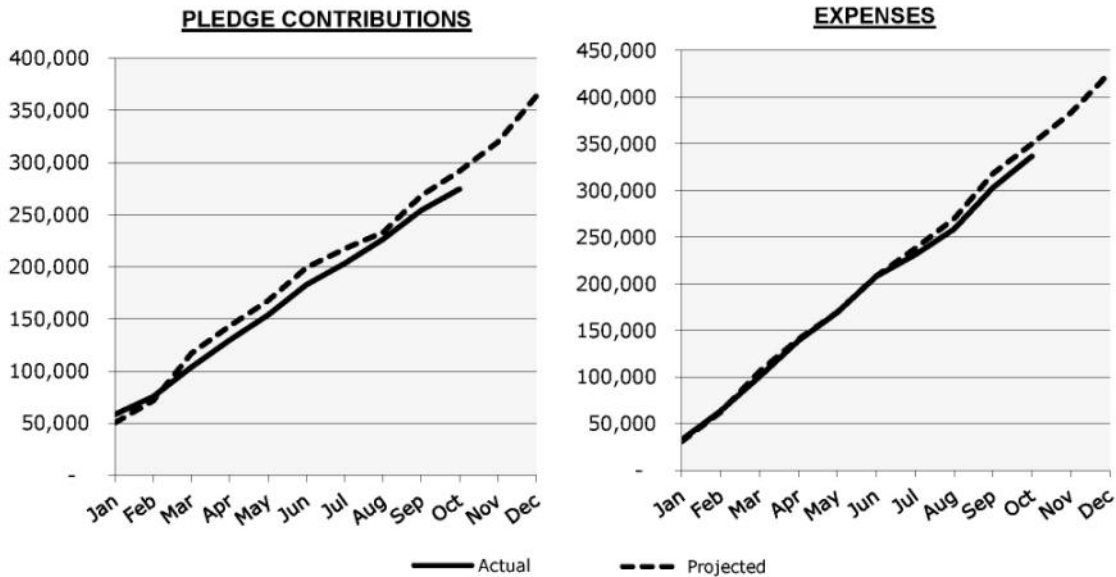
