Why Do Christians Celebrate Christmas on December 25th?

The original birthday of Jesus is unknown. The first celebrations of Christmas would have been in association with another faith festival, Epiphany, which happened on January 6th. Epiphany is the day Christians celebrate the coming of the Wise Men and the manifestation of Christ to the Gentile world. Even today, in some cultures, Epiphany is the day when gifts are traded.

In the second and third centuries there was much disagreement about the appropriateness of celebrating the birth of Christ. Many great leaders in the early church, such as Origen, felt that celebrating the birthday of our savior was just too close an association with the pagan practice of celebrating the birthdays of the gods.

We probably do not realize the enormous daily cost to be a Christian in the second and third centuries. Roman life was centered around pagan holidays in which practically everyone would enjoy taking part. These first Christians stood apart from their friends, neighbors, and business associates in their refusal to participate in such festivals. They were often ostracized for doing this at great economic and social cost. It is likely that the celebration of Christ's birth became common because these Christians who had lost the pagan festivals needed the rhythm and the faith discipline of special days throughout the Christian year to celebrate. By the year 272 C.E. the celebration of Christmas was common.

The sad irony is that Christmas has become so much a part of our culture that there is the danger of losing loses its ability to deepen our faith. Here are some ways for us to keep the festival as a faith celebration:

- Develop and keep meaningful rituals as a family, such as lighting the Advent wreath in your home, reading Christmas stories and Christmas tales that relate aspects of our faith, and working in a shelter or soup kitchen.
- ♦ In a culture that mistakenly believes more is better, use the season to practice simplicity. For every gift you receive, donate two items to the poor, and for every dollar you spend on gifts, share the same amount with organizations that support the poor.
- Determine to change the predictable negative outcomes that seem to habitually happen each year between some family members. Think through how you can defuse painful and charged issues to create a positive spirit.
- Invite someone new to your family gatherings who does not have a place to experience the holiday.

May God bless you in this season of peace, hope, love, and joy.



Jesus is the Teason, for the Season

Children's Ministry December 2013

It is so important that children from Christian families understand that the birth of Jesus is the reason for celebrating Christmas. It is something they need to be reminded of and shown year after year. Children need to know that gifts, parties, cookies and Santa may be fun, but they are not the true meaning of the holiday. Please make it a priority to come to church this Advent season as a way of bringing Christ into your Christmas. Also, consider doing some fun and meaningful Advent activities:

- ♦ Talk about what gifts you can give Jesus this Christmas: kindness, good deeds, etc.
- ♦ Give to the needy: donate food for Christmas dinners, Toys for Tots, donate unused clothes and toys, etc.
- ♦ Make cards for an elderly neighbor or seniors at a local nursing home.
- ♦ Go to church on Christmas Eve.
- ♦ Sing Christmas carols.
- ♦ Light Advent candles each night at your dinner table.
- ♦ Make homemade gifts with a loving heart.
- ♦ Talk about each piece as you put out your Manger scene.
- Read the Christmas story from your Bible, either a little each night or on Christmas morning in between opening gifts.
- Read books that tell about the birth of Jesus. There are many in our children's library that can be checked out. (Look on the display rack at the top of the stairs.)
- ♦ Make popcorn and watch *The Nativity* movie. This is also available in our adult library.

There are more wonderful ideas for celebrating Advent on the Internet. When your children are grown they will take these traditions and use them with their own family. That is what I have found with my own adult children.

Workshop Rotation – During Advent the children will gather together to learn about important people and animals leading to the birth of Jesus. We will gather as a group and learn through games, stories and crafts.

Week 1: December 8, the Angels; Week 2: December 15, Birthday Party for Jesus

Week 3: December 22, the donkey; Week 4: December 29, the sheep; Week 5: January 5, the kings and camels

Sunday school annual prayer mission – On December 8th the children will choose a *Peace* ornament off the Sunday school Christmas tree. The ornament will have the name of a military man or woman who they will commit to pray for throughout the Advent season. They will also make a commitment to pray for Peace on Earth. The prayers of children are very powerful if spoken from the heart. Please encourage your child to pray each day for the soldier they have chosen.

Birthday Party for Jesus – On December 15th, after the children's musical, the children will gather together in Dobstaff Hall to begin their Birthday Party for Jesus celebration. We will play games and make a craft. Once church is over the church families will join us to sing "Happy Birthday" to Jesus and eat birthday cake.

M&M Christmas Gathering – On December 15th, after fellowship time (about 11:00 a.m.), the M&M partners will gather together to make bird feeder ornaments to hang on the evergreen tree, which is a memorial to Mary Jane Schnack. Mary Jane is the one who started the M&M program and this will be a fun way for partners to celebrate the season and decorate the tree in a way that would please Mary Jane. Lunch will be provided.


