PASTORAL MESSAGE Rev. Allen Mothershed

TURNING ASIDE OR NOT?

Starting on Rally Day, September 10th, I will begin the first of a sermon series on "Attitudes of the Heart: Living the Faith." The first part of that series will be several sermons on "Compassion." For Christians, compassion is a core disposition of the heart (or attitude) out of which we are called to live in relationship to all living things including ourselves. We often think of compassion as having feelings of pity or concern for someone in pain and that is indeed part of its meanings. But the meaning is more profound. The Greek word in our Bible is "splagchnizomai" (please do not ask me how to say that!). It means a turning of the stomach which compels a person to take action. So we are not talking about just a feeling, but a body experience that causes someone to do something to deal with the pain of another.

It is one thing to say you feel sorry for what someone is going through, and quite another to not only feel sorry for someone's plight but to take action to in some way either help alleviate (if possible) or grant comfort. In Luke's gospel, the Samaritan man sees a fellow human being who has been mugged and left for dead on the side of the road and his stomach turns within himself and he cannot help but go over to the man and do whatever is necessary to comfort, protect, and bring healing to the man. You will remember the other two men who walked by. Perhaps they felt sad and disturbed at the sight of the man before quickly turning their heads and walking away. But that is not compassion. Our capacity for compassion means that we must allow the plight of others to cause a disturbance with our equilibrium to the point that we cannot stand by and do nothing.

We are tempted in life not to look too hard at the plight of people to the point of allowing ourselves to be disturbed. This morning as I was reading the Chicago Tribune, I saw the headline about 30 people who had been shot in the city during the past weekend. I wanted to look the other way. Those sorts of articles seem to be the focus of the Tribune's front page every day. I read about so many people being shot in neighborhoods I don't often travel through. Some of these people are innocent, others caught in the web of rival gang violence. Frankly, I've become numb to these reports. I don't want to let it sink in to the point where I feel pained by it and am compelled to act.

If it were a different story, maybe I would let it sink in. Let's say a terrorist attack is committed in Naperville or some other suburb near me and 30 people are badly injured and several have died. I would go to the trouble to turn on the TV, find a newspaper, call someone who can tell me the news. Just think: 30 people injured and some dead!

True, I don't always know what to do. I may not feel equipped to take on such an enormous problem as gang violence in our broken inner city upon whose well-being all our suburban communities depend. But I am reminded that the Samaritan did take action. He did what he could do, given the situation. It takes no intelligence to figure out who loved that man left for dead and who did not.

So this morning I read the report and when tempted to turn away, I read it again from beginning to end. I don't want to turn aside. I want to let the eyes of my heart see what is happening to people who are just as valuable and as human as I am, maybe more so in the eyes of our God, whose heart is with the dispossessed. Now I do feel compelled to do something, to care, to pray, to write this article, to demand to those in power that we act to take responsibility for the history of oppression that created this mess and inhumanity, and that we smartly commit resources to begin to solve what is a long-term problem. It is what the Samaritan man did. It is what Jesus did when He walked the road to the cross for the sake of us all. And it is what we who follow Jesus are asked to do, as well.

Outside of Christmas, Easter, and other important dates on the church or liturgical calendar, the prelude is usually something of a serious religious nature and typically not too loud or flashy. The selection is usually tied into the worship service thematically. Frequently, it presents a melody that will later be sung in the service. The prelude is not for entertainment or for the purpose of displaying technique, nor is it meant to quiet a congregation, but rather it is meant to prepare for the consideration of sacred things.

Safe travels and enjoy the rest of summer while it lasts!


