"The Word of God (in Jesus) became human so that we might become divine."

The goal of the Christian life is to become like God. That is our invitation from Jesus. He becomes a human being to help us to be like God. The early Christians believed that and strove for it with intentionality and dedication. Christians practiced forgiveness, hospitality, prayer, caring for the poor, and acts of generosity. It is a theology of Divinization (type that in your search engine and look at the Wikipedia article).

Unfortunately, somewhere along the line that high goal for the Christian life shifted from a focus on love to a focus on fear. Christians became preoccupied with doing things that will keep them out of hell or that will get them things from God. That is not a path to love and to life. The path to life is one dedicated to reflecting the divine nature.

How does that happen? How is that possible? Only through dwelling with God and taking into our own lives a deep abiding sense that we are beloved.

We also do it by making specific commitments to behaviors that reflect the love we receive into a world starved for love. That is to say, we understand ourselves as called by God to serve and we are willing to respond faithfully to that call.

I invite you to commit to living your faith at a higher level of devotion this year. Be faithful in your practice of worship, both in church and personal devotion. Commit to a specific ministry that will engage your gifts and transform your life. In Jesus, we become the sons and daughters of God.

A Different Response to the Events in Ferguson, Missouri

The events we have watched unfold in Ferguson, Missouri, are horrifying. We wonder how it is an unarmed young black man is shot many times by a policeman. The violent riots that tear apart a community, causing further harm to innocent neighbors, are disturbing. We cannot reverse the events that have taken place, nor do we know what the future will hold. There will be another tragedy if we are not willing to hear and understand one another. We need non-judgmental listening and understanding. What is clear is that whenever the final truth comes out, it will include the fact that racial divisions in our country are still wide.

Something different happened near Ferguson, at Gateway Middle School, that is hopeful. Rather than holding school with feelings so high, the teachers had the wisdom to let the youth talk and to listen to them. Here is what some of those youth said. See if you can listen and learn from their remarks. Attempt to be non-judgmental and non-reactive. Practice the compassion of Jesus' way. I also challenge each of us to talk to those of a different race and to be willing to listen to their perspective.

"Even if he did shoplift, he didn't deserve his life to be taken. There are some people who have done much worse things and they're still alive."

"I'd rather be heard peacefully instead of destroying the neighborhood I live [in]."

"I'm confused about why the officer shot Michael Brown in the first place, and why did he shoot him multiple times. I'm also confused about why do they choose to represent Michael with violence rather than peace."

"Would Michael Brown appreciate all the violence?"

"What if one day my brothers are walking down the street and the police try to beat them or even kill [them]?"

"I'm feeling, I don't know, like I can't even say the words I'm feeling because they are curse words. But I'm tired of turning on the news and know[ing] when they say someone has been shot that it's one of my kind."

Nazareth Neighborhood

Sunday morning schedule: Children preschool through fifth grade will join their parents for the first half of the Sunday morning worship service. Following the children's sermon, the children will be dismissed to attend Children's Worship upstairs in the Temple of Truth. The children will gather together for children's choir, announcements, a time of sharing and "Blessings and Bummers" (prayer requests). Following Children's worship, the shepherds will guide the K – 5th children to their workshops. They will experience a different workshop each week. The preschool age children will be in a classroom of their own taught with curriculum geared to their age and interests. Sunday school will dismiss at 11 a.m., allowing parents the opportunity to enjoy fellowship for a half hour after worship. The 6th graders are welcome to either remain in worship with their parents or join the children upstairs to serve as teacher and shepherd helpers; 7th and 8th graders will remain in worship as part of their confirmation requirements.

August 31st: No Sunday school, Labor Day weekend

Rally Day: September 7th will kick off the Sunday School year. The children will attend Children's Worship to meet and reacquaint with classmates and shepherds. We will dismiss at 10:30 on this special Sunday so the children can join their families at the Rally Day fun fair for games, prizes, moon jump, dunk tank, snow cones, popcorn, face painting, live music, lunch, and more. Be sure to stop by the Christian Education booth for bozo buckets, prizes, and M&M sign-up.

Workshop Rotation: September 15th- Jeremiah: Our first unit of workshop rotation is "Jeremiah". Throughout our five-week lesson the children will learn that Jeremiah was called to serve God while he was still a boy. Like Jesus, Jeremiah used familiar things to teach about how God wants us to live. People of all ages are called to serve God and live as God wants us to live. The story of Jeremiah will be taught in five workshops: Art, Cooking, Games, Science, and Storytelling. Preschool class: September 15th- The preschool age children will have their very own classroom to gather following Children's worship. They will grow in faith through activities geared to their age and interests.



Looking ahead: October 26th: Trunk or Treat from 3–5 pm. This is a fun event where members decorate their car trunks and children trick or treat from car to car. This is followed by a meal, live music, and games inside.

Blackberry Eating

By Galway Kinnell, 1927 -

I love to go out in late September among the fat, overripe, icy, black blackberries to eat blackberries for breakfast, the stalks very prickly, a penalty they earn for knowing the black art of blackberry making; and as I stand among them lifting the stalks to my mouth, the ripest berries fall almost unbidden to my tongue, as words sometimes do, certain peculiar words like *strengths* or *squinched* or *broughamed*, many-lettered, one-syllabled lumps, which I squeeze, squinch open, and splurge well in the silent, startled, icy, black language

of blackberry eating in late September.

Okay, I submitted this poem in November, a couple of years ago, but it is the end of the blackberry season here in Kazakhstan and they are delicious and I just kept coming back to this poem, so I decided it was worth the repeat. I love the sensuousness of the berries in this poem and the metaphoric sense of the fruit as words and I love blackberries, so here it is for your enjoyment. This copy came from *Poems, the Seagull Reader,* Joseph Kelly, ed. (Norton; New York, 2008), but it is widely anthologized.




SUNDAY SCHOOL SHEPHERDS AND TEACHERS NEEDED!
