Practicing the Presence of the Risen Christ

We choose daily about whether we live or disregard our faith. There are important practices of faith which are essential if we choose to live our faith. One of the practices is looking in every situation of our lives for the presence of Christ. In this season of resurrection, I invite you to become aware of Christ's presence in your life.

Anne Lamott in "Help, Thanks, Wow" tells a story about prayer and the practice of the presence of Christ: "Recently I was going to meet my great and amazing friends Barbara and Susie for a walk, or rather, a stroll and roll, as Barbara has Lou Gehrig's disease... which has come to mean she uses a walker, feeding tubes, and a computerized speaking device called Kate that works through her iPad. So Susie drove us to see the Pacific Ocean from above San Francisco's Moraga steps. I had not yet settled down into what is true- that Barbara is pretty sick and getting worse- so I sat in a state of jovial nervousness in the backseat, feeling alone and useless and superficial. When we arrived, the view was socked in with fog. We gamely got out of the car anyway, and on top of everything- the Lou Gehrig's, the vichyssoise fog, my anxious sorrow- there was one of those mean winds that prick your body and your mind and your very being...

It was all hopeless. I had no choice but to pray. This is all a mess, I said to God. I love these two women so much, and I had had such high hopes for connection and joy today: Help. And I got my divine revelation: We all needed to get back into the car, immediately.

This took a while, as there is not much immediately when you're with someone who has ALS. But at some point, warmth and golden sun flooded through the car windows, and Susie drove us around the neighborhood, and from inside we took in the brilliant gardens of succulents and crazy bright splashy exotic petals...

We all got so happy. We talked about real things for an hour: life, death, families, feeding tubes, faith. I asked Barbara, who does not eat food anymore, 'What are you most grateful for these days?' She typed on her iPad, and Kate's mechanical voice spoke for her: 'The beauty of nature, the birds and flowers, the beauty of friends.' This is called radical gratitude in the face of whatever life throws at you.

I wish I prayed more and better. But I think that I have begun to learn that it is not worth one iota of energy to dwell in a place of self disregard. Not. one. iota. It takes time and energy away from the relationship that we already have with God— a God, remember, who knows the best and worst about us and loves us still and all."

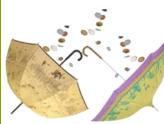

Let's turn our umbrellas upside down! God provided manna for the Israelites wandering in the wilderness. They didn't have to do anything for it, just gather up what they needed for the day. Our MANNA program

is just as easy. Simply order cards for the places you know you are going to shop anyway – grocery, drug stores, gas, etc. It costs you nothing and the retailers donate to St. Matthew.

Here's an example: I buy a \$100 Jewel card from Manna and Manna gives St. Matthew \$4. If I did this 50 weeks a year, the church would receive \$200. If 40 people did this, St. Matthew would receive \$8,000.

Last year we had 62 families who participated in Manna at one time or another, although our average is only 9 families per week. If all 62 families could participate regularly (weekly or even biweekly) we could easily make our fundraising goal for this year.

Opening and Affirming

The national church of the United Church of Christ has taken bold stands on issues of Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender equality. However, in the United Church of Christ, it is understood that national church does not speak for individual congregations

and believers. A process called "Open and Affirming" was set up for congregations to determine whether they are willing to declare themselves as both open to people of different orientations and also affirming of them as created by God as they are.

Our church has shown openness and its affirmation of different orientations. However, there is value in the church prayerfully deciding if they wish to declare themselves as open and affirming. A church making a declaration creates a safe place for people of different orientations, many of whom have suffered shame and guilt in churches that have left them fearful of the church and the Christian faith. It is a way to make sure what we mean when we say, "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." Also, coming to a clear understanding helps a church clarify who it is and how it will handle issues as they may come up in the future. Churches that become "Open and Affirming" still do not speak for the viewpoints of all their members, but attempt to come to as close to a consensus as is possible. We are a family at St. Matthew and we want to be a "healthy family" which means having the mutual respect to discuss our attitudes and feelings with one another. I believe we have a healthy respect for different viewpoints in our church and that we are at a place where we can have a healthy dialogue of what are, for some, difficult issues.

The first step is to assemble a team of 4-5 people who can understand the process and help implement it. We have a couple of people who have expressed interest and we would like to add 2 or 3 more people. Our hope is to include people who can create a safe place for people of different viewpoints to express themselves. Therefore, it is helpful to have people who feel they are open and affirming as well as those who are more ambivalent or even opposed. All should be represented in this leadership group. This group will then make a recommendation to the church council about what they believe needs to be our next steps. Contact me at allen.mothershed@stmatthewucc.org if you are interested.

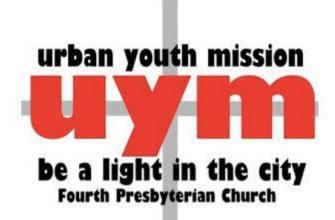

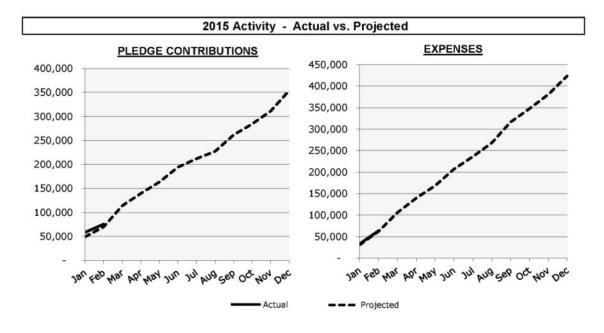
