Practicing the Faith We Confess

We are well aware now that the church as an institution is in trouble. Diane Butler Bass says that we are witnessing the end of the church, or at least the end of the conventional church. One in ten Americans now call themselves former Catholics. Mainline churches have been in decline since the mid-1960s. Now even conservative congregations are reporting a loss in membership, church attendance, and activity. More people say now, "I am spiritual, but not religious." Decades ago it was the other way around. We use to say young people will come back to church when they have children, but now they are not coming back.

Religion has become a "bad word" for many. The involvement of the church in politics and the culture wars where some parts of the church wish to push their agenda on the larger political and social culture is part of the problem. The sex scandals most visible in the Catholic church, but not limited to them, is another reason. Increased mobility (moving from community to community) and the high demands of work and family on people's time is yet another reason. We now live in a secular society where soccer and entertainment infringe on what use to be "church time."

The good news in all of this, Diane Butler Bass says, is that people are hungry for a genuine spiritual experience. Rather than bemoaning the fact that the church is losing membership, Diane Butler-Bass suggests that we become a more responsive church to this longing for spiritual formation.

We are fortunately in a good position to make a difference in people's lives. We are the repository of rich, time-tested stories, wisdom, and practices that feed the soul.

Jesus was dealing with similar problems we are now dealing with. Religion of his time was losing credibility with the people. Jesus said, "Listen to what they teach, but do not do as they do. "Therefore whatever they tell you to observe, that observe and do, but do not do according to their works." (Matthew 23:2) We in the church have the wisdom that brings life to people, but are we living that faith in our own lives?

What the church most needs now is faithfulness. We must speak with our actions. In this mass media market where everything is being spun and perception seems to be more important than substance, people are increasingly skeptical. They understandably trust more what they see rather than what they hear.

Do people see in our lives the practices of the faith being lived? Do they see us practicing reconciliation with one another and hospitality to the outcast? Is the church a place where people are allowed to be real, imperfect human beings hungry for relationships? Do we dare to be honest and support one another? Do we practice meaningful prayer and worship in ways that connect to the mystery and love of God?

This Lenten season is a time to examine our own lives - the way we live and do not live the faith. "Let your light shine that others may see in you the glory of God." Jesus is talking about our actions, not our words.



The Church Council has met for 2013. We have as a guide Matthew 5:16 "Make your light shine, so that others will see the good that you do and will praise your Father in heaven."



NOVEL APPROACHES



Pastor Allen's New Orleans Style Bread Pudding

Several have requested the bread pudding recipe for the desert at the Shrimp boil. Here it is!

Bread Pudding

14 oz of very stale French bread (must be stale)

1 cup of sugar

1 stick of butter

4 cups of milk

3 eggs

2 teaspoons of vanilla

1 teaspoons of cinnamon

1/2 to 1 teaspoon of nutmeg

salt to taste (maybe 1/2 teaspoon - but careful if you used salted butter)

raisins to taste (optional)

Optional: coconut and pineapples and 1 cup of Pina Colada liquid mix in place of one of the cups of milk. Also, you could add a meringue on top and pour the hot butter sauce on that right before serving!

Beat eggs, add melted butter to eggs (butter should not be so hot as to "cook" the eggs). Combine all ingredients. Should have liquid but not too soupy. Cook in the oven around 60 minutes at 330 temp. Check at 45 minutes. Should be slightly browning on top.

Butter Sauce

1 stick of butter 1 and 1/2 powdered sugar

Two egg yokes

1/4 to 1/2 cup of bourbon OR rum or bourbon non-alcoholic flavoring OR get creative!

On medium to low-medium heat melt butter and stir in the sugar until it is well mixed a good consistency. Take off the stove, let cool. Add the egg yokes and stir in. Add bourbon or non-alcoholic flavor and stir. The original recipe calls for no cooking. (You can cooks this in order to cook the egg and cook out the alcohol, but the egg may add some lumps to the sauce. We did this at the Shrimp boil.)

And now, for something completely different... The poem for March, from Linda Leinweber

February

By James Schuyler (1923-1991)

A chimney, breathing a little smoke, The sun, I can't see making a bit of pink I can't quite see in the blue. The pink of five tulips at five p.m. on the day before March first. The green of the tulip stems and leaves like something I can't remember, finding a jack-in-the-pulpit a long time ago and far away. Why it was December then and the sun was on the sea by the temples we'd gone to see. One green wave moved in the violet sea like the UN Building on big evenings, green and wet while the sky turns violet. A few of the almond trees had a few flowers, like a few snow flakes out of the blue looking pink in the light. A grey hush in which the boxy trucks roll up Second Avenue into the sky. They're just going over the hill. The green leaves of the tulips on my desk like grass-light on flesh, and a green copper steeple and streaks of cloud beginning to glow. I can't get over how it all works in together like a woman who just came to her window and stands there filling it jogging her baby in her arms. She's so far off. Is it the light that makes the baby pink? I can see the little fists and the rocking-horse motion of her breasts. It's getting grayer and cold and chilly. Two dog-sized lions face each other at the corners of a roof. It's the yellow dust inside the tulips. It's the shape of a tulip. It's the water in the drinking glass the tulips are in. It's a day like any other.

Here is a mid-20th century (1955) poem from Pulitzer Prize-winning James Schuyler, who was born in Chicago but was part of the New York literary and artistic circle for much of his life.

This poem stands out for me because it captures a series of images and brings them all together to create a mood, a feeling of late winter going to spring, and a day in New York. Much like the line in the poem, it all comes together somehow. Enjoy.
