The Challenge and the Opportunity of Prayer as We Begin Lent

Perhaps you learned at some point in your life one of the acronyms for prayer. There are a variety of them, but the one I learned was ACTS (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication). I can remember when I was much younger going through those four elements of prayer and attempting each time I prayed to devote time to each in the proper sequence. My having a sort of "formula" for prayer provided some direction which I needed, though my prayer life sounded more like an attempt to "get prayer right," rather than an honest conversation in the presence of the living God. Those elements of prayer are important to know, but prayer is ultimately not something we can put in a formula and then practice, but a living dialogue with God.

I can also remember using devotional books in my prayer life, which have been helpful. If you are looking for a wonderful devotional guide, "A Guide to Prayer for All Who Seek God" by Rueben Job is a great place to start. The advantage of a guidebook is that you will have a disciplined guide to prayer that will encourage you to pray with scripture and that will offer substantive reflections that can speak in a practical way to your life. On the other hand, the temptation is to let the reflections replace the hard work of prayer and of developing your relationship with God.

We must begin to pray with realistic expectation and a sense of what is our responsibility in prayer and what is finally up to God. Our responsibility is to set and keep the appointment. It is not only true that "90% of life is showing up," but the same is true for prayer. The truth is there is far greater pressure not to show up for prayer than there is to keep the discipline of praying on a daily basis.

When we pray, we pray into an awkward silence. This is the first thing you notice when you pray. You are praying to God, whom you do not physically see, and speaking words when you do not have the advantage of the visual and auditory cues and responses that you have when you speak to a friend or a close loved one. You are not always sure how what you say is being received and what the immediate effect of your prayer is. If you believe prayer is primarily giving God thanks and making supplication and you do that in prayer, then what? More silence.

The first truth about prayer is that God is primarily in the silence. God is not an overly pleasing friend who shows up and listens to everything we say at our beckoning call and gives us instant gratification for what we say or ask. God is a holy other desiring to relate to us, but not just on our terms. In prayer we first learn to befriend the silence of the prayer time, to see the silence as a sort of first gracious gift of God to us. If we can accept the silence, not always fill the space with our many words, but be in the silence, our prayers can deepen and God, in God's own time, will speak to our heart. In silence, we can get to words that reflect our true heart's desire, which is usually not related to the first words that come to our minds. The chatter must clear for the heartfelt words to arise and connection to be made.

Some have declared prayer as a war with one's self, and I believe there is truth to that. Keeping the appointment is likely to only happen if we also are willing to understand this profound gift of the silence. In time, we come to understand that God is in that silence and in a larger sense always the Faithful One with us. May you keep the appointment this Lenten season and come to know the depths of God's love for you.

The Guzman Story

In 2001, in response to the devastation caused by Hurricane Mitch, a group of St. Matthew members went to Honduras to build houses. During that trip they met the Guzman family (1) and witnessed their dangerous living conditions. Upon their return, they had a Honduran Marketplace fundraiser (3) where they raised enough money to return in 2004 to build a small home for the Guzman family (4). The Guzman family worked alongside the St. Matthew members building their home. During the work trip, as the St. Matthew members got to know the family and understood why God brought them together, an unbreakable bond was born (5). They learned during this trip that the best gift to give, to ensure a way of rising above the poverty level, is to give the children an education where they learn to speak English. With the help of Honduran friends, whose house the St. Matthew group stays in during each trip, they enrolled the children in a bilingual school. Their education is funded by the commitment of a number of St. Matthew members to give regularly and an annual amount from the mission fund. Following a work trip to Guatemala in 2006, a group went to Honduras to spend a weekend with the Guzman family (6) and tour their school (7). They returned again in 2010 to attend Daniel Guzman's 6th grade graduation (8). During the trip they were aware that the way to ensure the family's safety was to return and build a security wall around their home. They returned in 2011 and built the wall (9).

The Guzman education fund covers what is needed for Claudeth and Daniel to attend a private English school in San Pedro Sula. School needs include: tuition, enrollment, class trips, books, uniforms, bus fare, computer, internet, etc. We do not support the Guzman family in other ways. Catalina Guzman supports her family. She travels by bus, 4 hours per day, 6 days a week, to her job in San Pedro Sula. She makes \$8 per day, with \$2 of that going toward her transportation. She leaves her home at 6 a.m. and returns at 8 p.m. (3:30 p.m. on Saturdays). She pays her own taxes, utilities and buys the food for her family. Most young adults Daniel and Claudeth's age are already working and married, but because Catalina wants a better life for her children, she is willing to work hard for them. She is so grateful for all that St. Matthew does for her children and makes it clear through computer messages and phone conversations.

Daniel's trip to the U.S. was the dream of a lifetime and an answer to prayers for him, his mother and us at St. Matthew. With his classmates, he attended an International meeting provided by the University of Chicago and went to Orlando Universal Studios for some fun. We were blessed to have him spend some quality time with us before he returned to Honduras. When Daniel was asked what was his favorite part of his trip was, "the roller coasters in Orlando or the car show in Chicago?" he answered, "My favorite was meeting my St. Matthew friends who have changed my life."

On behalf of the Guzman family, thank you so much for being the light of Christ in their lives!

Children's Ministry March 2014

The children made invitations and a take-home gift to give each adult friend invited. Come and enjoy food and desserts, fun dances (line dancing, Hokey Pokey, YMCA, etc.) and other activities (Lego building, craft, photo booth, raffle, etc.). Easter Egg Hunt, April 12, 10:00 a.m.: Bring your bag or basket to this fun all-community Easter Egg hunt. Following the hunt we will gather in Dobstaff Hall for donuts, drinks, and a visit with the Easter Bunny. Bring your camera and invite your friends for this fun event.

Sunday school mission projects: Our two Sunday school mission projects are in full swing. We are finishing up our care package collection and on March 2, during the Sunday school hour, we will pack boxes. A big THANK YOU to everyone who donated to this mission that reminds our military and students that they are not forgotten. The children are still earning quarters to fill their M&M cylinders. The quarters collected will go to families of Bridge Communities.

Workshop Rotation: March 9, Resurrection Revealed – Easter Seen Through Symbols: It is important to remind our children that Easter is not just about chocolate bunnies and Easter baskets. We need to point them to the Good News of Christ's resurrection. Easter symbols can help them understand the Easter story. During this unit, the children will discover how symbols point to the real reason of Easter: jelly beans, hot cross buns, Easter eggs, lambs, rocks, palms, thorns, wine and bread. In Art, Drama, Storytelling, Archeological Dig, Cooking and Historical Re-Enactment workshops the children will not only learn and understand the Easter story; they will be able to tell the story of Easter to others.



As a special enhancement, the children will collect a symbol of Easter in each workshop they attend. They will put each of these symbols in a plastic egg. (There are 6 eggs total to collect). Each child will also receive an egg carton in which they will place the plastic eggs with the Easter symbols that they receive each week. It is hoped by the end of the unit that children will be able to tell the Easter story by using the symbols they have collected.

2014 Chili Cook-off Winning Recipe

Makes 8 servings

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 onions, chopped

1 small bell pepper, diced (optional)

1 stick celery, diced (optional)

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 pound ground beef

3/4 pound beef sirloin, cubed

1 (14.5 ounce) can peeled and diced tomatoes with juice

1 (12 fluid ounce) can or bottle dark beer

1 cup strong brewed coffee

2 (6 ounce) cans tomato paste

1 (14 ounce) can beef broth

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

3 1/2 tablespoons chili powder

1 tablespoon cumin seeds

1 tablespoon unsweetened cocoa powder

1 teaspoon dried oregano

1 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper

1 teaspoon ground coriander

1 teaspoon salt

4 (15 ounce) cans kidney beans

4 fresh hot chili peppers, seeded and chopped

Directions:

Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Cook onions, garlic, (bell peppers and celery if desired) ground beef and cubed sirloin in oil for 10 minutes, or until the meat is well browned and the onions are tender.

Mix in the diced tomatoes with juice, dark beer, coffee, tomato paste and beef broth. Season with brown sugar, chili powder, cumin, cocoa powder, oregano, cayenne pepper, coriander and salt. Stir in 2 cans of the beans and hot chile peppers. Reduce heat to low, and simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Stir in the 2 remaining cans of beans, and simmer for another 30 minutes.

Healthy Alternative: use ground turkey and cut the other meats out. For vegetarian, take out all meats and add celery and green pepper or other vegetable like zucchini or eggplant. Leave out the hot chile pepper if you do not like "REAL" hot.

And now...for something completely different: A poem for March from Linda Leinweber.

Spring and All

By William Carlos Williams, 1923

By the road to the contagious hospital under the surge of the blue mottled clouds driven from the northeast—a cold wind. Beyond, the waste of broad, muddy fields brown with dried weeds, standing and fallen

patches of standing water the scattering of tall trees

All along the road the reddish purplish, forked, upstanding, twiggy stuff of bushes and small trees with dead, brown leaves under them leafless vines—

Lifeless in appearance, sluggish dazed spring approaches—

They enter the new world naked, cold, uncertain of all save that they enter. All about them the cold, familiar wind—

Now the grass, tomorrow
The stiff curl of wild carrot leaf
One by one objects are defined—
It quickens: clarity, outline of leaf

But now the stark dignity of entrance—Still, the profound change has come upon them: rooted, they grip down and begin to awaken


Once you get past puzzling over what, exactly, a contagious hospital is (Williams was a doctor), you can relax and enjoy this poem for its imagery, which captures the transition from dead winter to the renewed life of spring. Williams rejected T. S. Eliot's academic approach to poetry and wanted his poems to reflect not ideas but the singularity of things. Many view this poem as a direct response to Eliot's "April is the cruelest month..." of *The Waste Land*. Of note is the way Williams runs his lines together, using lots of dashes and few end stops, as if this is being breathlessly experienced. I submitted this once before to *The Voice*, but it is worth a second look and perfect for March in the Midwest. It is widely anthologized, but I got it from *The Top 500 Poems*, *A Columbia Anthology*, edited by William Harmon. Enjoy!
