PASTORAL MESSAGE Rev. Allen Mothershed

"HANDLING A PANHANDLER?"

So you pull up to a red light, and walking between the cars is a panhandler. What do you do? Turn and head the other way and attempt to freeze them out? Pray the light turns green soon? Wished the police would keep people like this off the roads? Take out some pocket change and quickly give it to the person before the light changes?

Some believe strongly about not giving for a variety of reasons. "Rather than having a real job, maybe he or she is professional beggar who is making money taking advantage of people's feelings of compassion." "Who knows how they will spend the money. Alcohol? drugs? cigarettes?" "If I give I'll be contributing to a 'public nuisance'." Or maybe we say to ourselves, "I give money to social service organizations as a better use of my money. They can determine the need and be more equitable than I can." Our reactions do tell us a lot about ourselves and the attitudes we have.

But sometimes our heart strings are pulled and we feel moved to do something. We see the face of the person and fear that in passing her up we have denied a person in need and betrayed our faith. After all, who are we to judge? Who has walked in this person's shoes? There are desperate people with great need and people who, for many reasons, do go hungry. This is true even in our country of abundance. Maybe this is actually someone God is hoping I will help. After all, Jesus said, "Give to everyone who asks you for something. Don't turn anyone away who wants to borrow something from you" (Matthew 5:42).

I recently read an article which refers to Pope Francis on this issue. The Pope encourages us to freely give to any who asks. He offers a fresh way to explore this issue. He tells us "to preserve dignity, to see another person not as a pathology or a social condition, but as a human, with a life whose value is equal to your own." So do not refuse him or her. If you have the means, give to this person and be sure to smile and look them in the eyes and acknowledge their humanity.

Maybe you will disagree with this, but what I like about his suggestion is that it shifts our way of thinking about this issue. Maybe the issue is not so much about the need or the character of the person asking, but more about our need to be in relationship to those less fortunate than we are and to practice unconditional generosity, which Jesus told us to do. Who knows the angels God places in our path to remind us of our common humanity?

So no easy answers here. Just a desire to live as close to the way of Jesus as possible.

Olivet Conference & Retreat Center in Farmington, MN - an easy 6 hour drive from Wheaton. Camp dates are Saturday, July 22nd to Friday, July 28th.

Family Camp is perfect for anyone who likes to be in fellowship with others in our church family. Families with young kids, older kids, or no kids at all, as well as single people have been a part of our Family Camp tradition that goes back more than 30 years. Mt. Olivet is surrounded by an exceptional area of natural beauty, and has a strong commitment to green and sustainable initiatives. How you spend your time at camp is up to youthere's nearby hiking, golf, hot air balloon rides, a historic river town, local brewpubs, wineries, and craft spirits distilleries. Some of us will take a trip to Minneapolis/St. Paul, visit the Mall of America, take a boat cruise, or go on a canoe trip. In addition, there are plenty of activities on-site at Mt. Olivet, including over five miles of nature trails, volleyball and basketball courts, horseshoes, an outdoor patio with a fireplace (which looks perfect for our Happy Hours!), a game room, and an indoor pool, whirlpool, and sauna. Also, back by popular demand, we will be building and flying kites and model rockets! If all this sounds like too much, don't worry - every year at Family Camp there are folks who spend their week reading or relaxing in a rocking chair.

MANNA PROGRAM



Pennies From Heaven - Let's turn our umbrellas upside down! God provided manna for the Israelites wandering in the wilderness. They didn't have to do anything for it, just gather up what they needed for the day. Our MANNA program is just as easy. Simply order cards for the places you know you are going to shop anyway - grocery, drug stores, gas, etc. It

costs you nothing and the retailers donate to St. Matthew.

Here's an example: I buy a \$100 Jewel card from Manna and Manna gives St. Matthew \$4. If I did this 50 weeks a year, the church would receive \$200. If 40 people did this, St. Matthew would receive \$8,000.

Last year we had 70 families who participated in Manna at one time or another, although our average is only 9 families per week. If all 70 families could participate regularly (weekly or even bi-weekly) we could easily make our fundraising goal for this year.

GREEN FLAG CELEBRATION

Are you curious how St. Matthew earned an Earth Flag certification from SCARCE (School and Community Assistance for Recycling and Composting Education), an educational non-profit in DuPage County whose purpose is to create sustainable communities? For nearly five years lots of people have been involved in making St. Matthew an eco-friendly church.

We've become eco-friendly by having SCARCE conduct a "green audit" at church to identify areas where we can improve, staff members attended environmental training sessions and volunteers are replacing incandescent light bulbs with LED bulbs. Over the years church members have participated by recycling things like ink cartridges and Altoid containers. Recycling for churches and businesses is not automatic, but we arranged with our waste hauler to recycle because we felt that was the responsible thing to do. We use non-toxic cleaning products in the building, and limit the use of disposable dishes and utensils in the kitchen. We publish The Voice and Church Directory electronically to save paper. You can find environmental tips in The Happenings to use at home. Our Sunday School children complete projects using recycled materials, cultivated a vegetable garden on church property and will be planting a monarch butterfly garden this spring to help reverse the decreasing butterfly population.

On Green Flag Sunday, April 23rd, we will be celebrating our accomplishments to be good stewards of the earth. Celebrate with us as Kay McKeen from SCARCE presents us our Earth Flag, we view a video presentation about the St. Matthew efforts to care for the living environment and we praise God for the wonders of Creation.

We will be wearing green to church to celebrate and would like you to help us with our "green treats" for Coffee Hour. Think green rice krispies, green cupcakes, green mint cake, and green jello (or search online!).

CROP WALK

We hope you will join us on Sunday, May 7th, as **ENDING HUNGER ONE STEP AT A TIME**St. Matthew participates in the annual CROP Hunger Walk with other churches from Glen Ellyn and Wheaton. CROP stands for Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty, and the walk raises awareness and funds to fight poverty and hunger across the U.S. and in more than 35 countries around the world.

Lenten Workshop Rotation

In April, the children will continue to learn about the events that took place during Holy Week. Each week, following the lesson, the children color pages in their Easter coloring/story book, which tells the story of Jesus's final days and His resurrection. At the close of our Easter lesson, the children will take their book home to share with their family.

Green Flag Sunday, April 23rd during the 9:30am worship service St. Matthew is working hard to become a "Green" church. Staff and leaders have met several times with members of "SCARCE" in Glen Ellyn to learn about changes that need to be made in order for St. Matthew to comply with what is needed to receive our Green flag. The worship service will be devoted to the environment and the children will sing "The Earth Promise Song," which they have begun practicing on Sunday morning. We ask that you and your children wear something any shade of green that Sunday, so we can be a united front as we move forward on our mission to "Go Green." Following worship, we will celebrate by eating fun green snacks in Dobstaff Hall. There will be no Sunday School so the children can experience the entire service and celebration after worship.

The Sunday School department is doing their part to become environmentally friendly. We are making changes to our program by using more recycled craft supplies, products without chemicals and avoiding helium (which is at a dangerous low). We will also continue teaching the children that God created us as the keepers and caretakers of all creation, which includes land, air, water and creatures.

Monarch Butterfly



This spring, as the children continue learning ways to help God's creation, we will be planting a Monarch Butterfly garden. This once-abundant butterfly population is at a dangerous low, and by planting milkweed and other flowers that attract the monarch we will be doing our part to restore the population. We will also watch as caterpillars transform into butterflies with our very own butterfly

habitat. When the time is right we will release the butterflies in an area abundant with plants that feed and expand their population. More information will be shared as we get closer to planting season.

Other than that, let me know if you want to help out with crazies, or if you think of something that would be cool to do with the youth group.


